## Shortage Of Scriptures Says Quigg

SOURIS — Rev. Donald M. Quigg, district secretary for the Canadian Bible Society in P.E.I. and N.B., said here Wednesday there was a "critical shortage of Scriptures in the world."

Mr. Quigg, speaking to delegates from Bay Fortune, Kingsboro and Souris at a rally in St. James United Church, urged urged wholehearted co-operation "to meet the crisis in the circulation of the Scriptures."

This crisis, he said was caused by the rapid increase in the world's population, literacy growth, and "the ever-present fact of poverty on a colossal scale."

Malcolm O. Smith of Kingsboro, assisted by George Leard of Souris, conducted the meeting.

The group viewed a film, "Freedom in Their Souls," depicting life in Africa.

In attendance were members of Kingsboro Young People's Society, who cancelled their regular meeting to be present.

Large amounts were allocated for the Mactaquac hydro-electric power project in New Brunswick and for a power development at Baie D'Espoir, Nfld.

"As the minister responsible, I have been authorized to advise the Atlantic Development Board not to hesitate to recommend worthwhile and economically sound projects because of the state of the fund," Mr. Pickersgill said.

"It is the intention of the present government to recommend to the next parliament whatever action may be necessary to enable the board to continue to make capital grants so long as they are needed to carry out the purpose of the Atlantic Development Board as defined by parliament."

Mr. Pickersgill spoke of Liberal party accomplishments and referred critically to "the leader of the other party asking the lost sheep to come back." He said the reason we do not have so many Liberal prime ministers is because "they last so long — they wear so well."

"To keep the peace is more important than good times and 'if we Liberals work together, we will make the greatest progress this country has ever known,'" he said.

## Glowing Picture Painted Of '67 Centennial Plans

HALIFAX (CP) — Officials of the Canadian Centennial Commission painted a glowing coast-to-coast picture of plans for the 1967 national celebration at a press conference here Thursday.

But Dr. Norman A. MacKenzie of Vancouver, commission director and president of the Canadian Centenary Council, sounded a warning note. He said that "unless local groups and individuals take this centennial seriously it's not going to be much of a success."

However, he added, if the Confederation centennial is a success Canada will be a better place for future generations. That was the only justification for the celebration.

Touching briefly on provincial planning efforts, Dr. MacKenzie said Saskatchewan is "well out in front," thanks partly to a head start it got celebrating its diamond jubilee as a province this year. More than 500 local jubilee committees would continue in action there as 1967 planning groups.

Quebec province was in a "unique position" but he thought the government and people of that province were "doing very well in their own way."

Prince Edward Island had staged a successful centennial celebration of the 1864 Charlottetown conference last year and they could not be expected to repeat that in 1967.

Peter Aykroyd, centennial public relations director, said the commission has approved federal grants for Nova Scotia municipal and community projects totalling \$250,000 to date. These projects, mainly parks, libraries, museums and recreation centres, totalling \$1,081,000 when provincial and local contributions were added.

Approved in N.S., Attorney-General Richard A. Donahoe, head of the Nova Scotia centennial organization, said several additional projects have received provincial approval but have not yet been submitted to Ottawa. The province issued a second call for project proposals when available funds were left unappropriated after the first deadline in 1964.

Nova Scotia had deliberately restricted the number of local projects with the aim of promoting more substantial and more worthwhile enterprises with the money available.

Mr. Donahoe said the city of Halifax has indicated it plans a large-scale centennial celebration for 1967 and he expects that other large centres in the province will do likewise.

## Presbyterian Church Marks 38th Anniversary

This Sunday, the congregation of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Montague, will observe the 38th anniversary of the dedication of its present church building.

The speaker at the evening service will be the Moderator of the 91st General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, Rev. J. Alan Munro, B.A., M.C., D.D. of Toronto.

Although the present church building was built in 1885 and served as a Methodist Church for 40 years, it was in 1927 that it was re-opened as St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church.

The congregation itself dates back over a century. As early as 1775, there were Presbyterian families from Scotland living in the vicinity of Montague. And the sparse records still available indicate that in 1843, if not earlier, there was a Presbyterian congregation in Montague.
