

# Provincial High Football Starts

SUMMERSIDE — The opening game in the Provincial High School Football League is scheduled for the Summerside Queen Elizabeth Park this afternoon at four o'clock.

St. Dunstan's High School of Charlottetown open defence of their crown — which they coped for the past three years — when they clash with the 1965 third place finishers, Summerside High.

David Lidstone, principal of Summerside High, will make the first kick-off, and Fred Ripley, referee of the P.E.I.A.A., will be in charge of the game officiating.

The game is in its fourth year at Summerside High, having been initially sponsored by the Legion which raised funds through a sportsmen's dinner. Maintaining of equipment, etc. since then has been financed by the town school board.

The schedule will wind up here and in Montague Nov. 5,

with the first and second place finishers playing in the Potato Bowl game for the Provincial Championship on Nov. 11.

F-L Gordon Montford coaches the locals, with assistance from F-O Russ Lindgar, and Summerside High grad, Paul Offer.

Also scheduled for play either Friday or Saturday of this week are Montague and Souris, in Souris. Souris were in the league finals last year by virtue of a second-place finish in the four-team league, with Summerside third and Montague fourth.

Physical education director Charles Ballam said yesterday that he hopes for a good turnout of townspeople at the initial contest.

Montague will be here October 26, and Souris visit in the final game here November 5.

# Cardinals Blank Dodgers; Indians Whip Twins 4-0

**ST. LOUIS (AP)** — Rookie Larry Jaster tied a 50-year-old record for shutouts and threw a roadblock into Los Angeles Dodgers' drive for the National League pennant Wednesday night by pitching a four hitter as St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Dodgers 3-0.

Jaster, 22-year-old southpaw, shut out the Dodgers for the fifth consecutive time this season. He tied a modern NL record held by Grover Alexander, who pitched five shutouts for Philadelphia against Cincinnati in 1916. Alexander's shutout, however, were not in succession.

Jaster also broke the record of four consecutive shutouts against one team held by Fred Fitzsimmons of New York Giants, who accomplished the feat against Cincinnati in 1929.

Rookie Ed Spiezio gave Jaster all the help he needed with a two-run double in the fourth inning against loser Don Sutton.

**MINNEAPOLIS (AP)** — Cleveland Indians spoiled Jim Kaat's bid to become the biggest winner in the major leagues Wednesday by defeating Minnesota Twins 4-0 behind Luis Tiant's six-hit pitching.

Kaat, whose 25 victories ties him with Sandy Koufax of Los Angeles Dodgers for the major league lead, was tagged with his 12th defeat. He yielded six hits in eight innings, including Joe Ascue's eighth home run.

Tony Oliva, runner-up to Frank Robinson of Baltimore Orioles in the American-League batting race, had three hits. This lifted his average to .308. Robinson is hitting .316.

**PHILADELPHIA (AP)** — A pair of throwing errors by shortstop Dick Groat helped Pittsburgh Pirates to two runs as they clung to their National League pennant hopes with a 4-2 victory over Philadelphia Phillies in the second game and a sweep of a tri-night doubleheader Wednesday.

Don Clendenon's 28th home run and a sensational final out fielding play by third baseman Jose Pagan helped the Pirates to a 2-1 victory in the opener.

The sweep moved Pittsburgh within 1 1/2 games of first-place Los Angeles. The Pirates have three games to play and the Dodgers four.

Bob Veale and Larry Jackson were locked in a 2-2 tie in the eighth inning of the second game when Pittsburgh scored twice.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Don Clendenon's 28th home run and clutch relief pitching by Steve Blass and Tommy Sisk carried Pittsburgh Pirates to a 2-1 victory over Philadelphia Phillies Wednesday night in the first game of a crucial two-night doubleheader in the National League.

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Bob Shaw pitched a six-hit shutout in leading New York Mets to a 1-0 victory over Chicago Cubs and a split of a doubleheader Wednesday.

Ron Santo drove in two runs with his 30th homer and a double as the Cubs won the first game 4-1. The Mets executed a triple play in the sixth inning of the first game, the sixth in the majors this season.

The Mets got the only run of the nightcap in the seventh on Cleon Jones' infield hit which scored Jerry Grote.

The games attracted 2,481 fans, a record low for the Mets at Shea Stadium.

# Pirate Fans Think Matty Greatest Of Many Alous

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Matty Alou always was "the other Alou" until this year.

Now he is No. 1 among the three brothers from the Dominican Republic who are playing in the National League.

Unless Matty runs into an 0 for 20 slump this week, he will win the league batting championship.

Brother Felipe, 31, has been an establish big leaguer since 1958. Big brother Jesus, 23, came up to San Francisco Giants with the trumpets proclaiming him as the greatest. Matty, 27, always was just another ball player. There was a day in 1963, when the three brothers were together in the San Francisco outfield.

Felipe, now with Atlanta Braves, is chasing Matty of Pittsburgh Pirates for the batting title. Jesus is having a so-so season with the Giants. Matty, a .231 flop with the Giants last year, was hitting .344 in games through Tuesday.

**CHANGED HIS STYLE**  
Pittsburgh manager Harry Walker changed Matty from a swinger to a smart hitter.

The Pirates got him from the Giants last Dec. 1 in a deal what sent pitcher Joe Gibbon to San Francisco.

If he had stayed in San Francisco he still would have been just another ball player, said Walker.

"The infield at Candlestick Park is too soft for him. He gets a lot of hits on high bouncers off our hard infield. The wind always was blowing against him at San Francisco and that makes hitters mentally depressed."

"No, I do not think this is any fluke year. I don't expect him to hit .340 again but his range should be between .300 and .320."

"When we got him, we thought he had a chance to be a .300 hitter. And he has worked at it. I talked to him in spring training in Florida. I told him he could improve his hitting if he could learn to control the bat."

Alou gives Walker credit for changing his batting style. He also thinks it helped to get away from the wind and cold weather in San Francisco. The fact that he shares centre field with Manny Mota and seldom faces left-handed pitching was another factor in his success.

"Walker opened up a brand new world for me," he said. "Nobody ever taught me how to hit to left field before; left-handed batters normally pull the ball to right field. His lesson made all the difference possible. I never realized how much it could mean to me."

# Ceebees Win City Ch'ship

The Ceebees defeated the Dodgers 19-9 last night to win the City Softball League Championship after a long five game series which was fought tight to the wire. This final game at Victoria Park was begun Tuesday but had to be postponed after three innings with the score at 15-9 for the winners who came back to finish last night and allowed no runs while they racked up another four.

In the first inning Tuesday, the Ceebees slammed in fourteen runs to put the game way out of Dodgers reach. From then on it was merely wrapping up.

Freddy Morrison started on the mound for the Ceebees and was relieved by John Hughes in the fourth inning. They gave up nine hits, walked nine, and struck out four.

Tele Gregory started for the losers. He was relieved by Reg Flannigan who finished. These two allowed twelve hits, walked eight and struck out three. They were backed by miserable fielding.

Phil Arbing and Gerard Smith both went three for five for the Ceebees.

# Knudson Leads Pre-Tournament

VANCOUVER (CP) — Canadian pro George Knudson and three amateur partners carded a 13-under-par 58 at rain-soaked Shaughnessy Golf and Country Club Wednesday to defeat an international field in the Pro-AM tournament which precedes today's Canadian Open.

Knudson, 28, from Toronto, scored an individual two-under 60 to finish one stroke behind co-leaders Billy Martindale of Dallas, Tex., and Jim Ferree of Savannah, Ga., both with 68s.

Knudson and his partners—Del Sinclair of Toronto and William Hill and Alfred Heaslip, both of Vancouver — finished three strokes ahead of four other teams tied for second.

**WON \$775**  
The victory was worth \$775 for Knudson. He won \$400 as a member "of the low team and \$375 as third low professional in individual scoring.

Martindale and Ferree split first and second-money in the individual category, each taking \$462.50.

Tied for second in the team competition with 61s were four-somes led by pros Bob Charles of Christchurch, N.Z., Bob Goshay of Belleville, Ill., Ron Funseth of Spokane, Wash., and Gene Counter of Seattle, Wash.

The four pros received splits of \$275-quarter shares of the prize money for second, third, fourth and fifth in the team competition.
