Beliveau Under-rated Says Goalie Glen Hall

MONTREAL (CP) — Glenn Hall says Montreal's rangy centre, Jean Beliveau is "vastly under-rated."

"When that big guy has a few chances in close, he's going to score. You can't stop him," said Hall. The round-cheeked Chicago goalies slowly peeled off his gear Saturday night after Canadiens rallied powerfully in the third period to the Hawks 2-3. Beliveau had scored the tying goal midway through the last period by flicking in a rebound.

"Beliveau always plays a great game against us. If he plays the same way against everybody else, he's one of the three or four outstanding players in the league," said Hall. "I don't know why he doesn't get more attention."

He's got five of his 10 goals against us. I don't know what it is, but he can't buy a goal against the other teams. But that's a great player for you — he gets the important ones. "Beliveau had 10 shots on me, somebody says. Still, the roughest shot was when Henri Richard came in alone in the last minute — just managed to get my pads onto it."

"That Little Rocket can shoot from just about anywhere, even with two guys on his back. And with 20 seconds left, you can't expect your team to get the goal back."

Beliveau was smiling in the Canadiens' room. "I thought I was going to get one about five minutes earlier," he said. "I had the net, but I couldn't lift it over him. The next time, I aimed for the roof."

Montreal Coach Toe Blake said he had been pleased with the performance of Bernie Geoffrin, playing his first full game after a 12-game absence with a wrist injury.

Chicago coach Rudy Pilous barred the door to reporters while he gave his players a talking-to. Pilous said angrily later, "we had them on the run in the first two periods, but we fell apart in the third. Luckily, Glenn was superb."

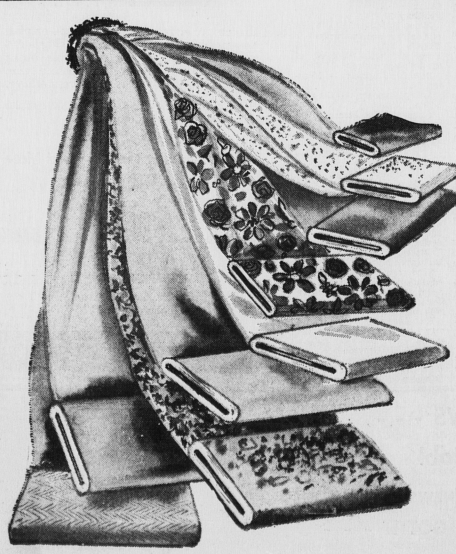
