Men Of Trinity Will Launch Christmas Tree Sale Today

Three members of Trinity's Men's Association this afternoon will be on duty as they open their Christmas tree sale from which they hope to raise funds for re-building and renovating the youth camp at Augustine Cove. This project is part of the island-wide effort by the men's clubs of the United Church to assist in providing better camping facilities for the young folk. The trees are being stored on the church property to the rear of Heartz hall and a volunteer crew under the supervision of Arthur Robinson will be on hand each evening from 6.30 to 10.30 to take orders until the trees are sold. Supplying the trees are three other men's clubs from Cornwall, York and Mount Stewart. In this way the rural clubs fulfill their obligation to the camp along with the men of Trinity. The trees averaging 6 1/2 feet in height are mostly firs but a few pines may be found among them. Mr. Robinson suggests that anyone desiring a tree should contact the club early as the demand promises to be great.

New Task For Canada Seen In United Nations

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada is expected soon to get another United Nations task: Membership on a permanent committee designed to regulate the peaceful uses of outer space.

Opinion here is that chances promising that the United States and Russia will be able to agree on composition of such a committee before the current UN general assembly meeting ends. Canada is already a member of the 10-nation UN disarmament committee which will begin negotiations early next year.

Peaceful use of outer space is another aspect of disarmament and it was the No. 2 subject in External Affairs Minister Green's speech outlining Canadian policy to the UN general assembly Sept. 24.

More than two years ago, Prime Minister Diefenbaker urged that the passage of time should not be allowed to bring to the problem of outer space the complications that failure to reach agreement on nuclear weapons has brought to that problem.

Mr. Diefenbaker has said that jurisdiction over the exploration of space, whether by manned or unmanned vehicles, should be vested in the UN. "It must be assured," he said "that outer space will be used for scientific and peaceful uses only, that all nations, great or small, should have equal territorial rights and that the launching of all space vehicles should be preceded by notification so that the benefits accruing should be available to all mankind."

The prime minister pledged in a speech at Kingston, Ont., last May 15 that Canada would make every effort to help find an agreement on outer space. Apart from disarmament, there was perhaps no more important matter that required co-operation of the major industrial nations, he said.

Canada was a member of a special UN committee on the peaceful uses of outer space which first convened last May 6. Russia boycotted the group on the grounds that Communist states did not have sufficient representation.

Now the U.S. apparently is willing that Communist membership be increased to seven—from three with 12 Western countries and five neutrals.

In his UN speech, Mr. Green referred to the "magnificent achievement" of the Soviet moon rocket.

He added that the rocket emphasizes "the great necessity of having the international community establish adequate regulation where none exists."

New Tanker To Waterfront Unloads Large Fuel Oil Cargo

A huge tanker new to the port of Charlottetown, the MT Naeco, arrived in the harbor shortly before 3 o'clock yesterday bringing a cargo of 151,960 barrels of heating oils and gasolines for the local Irving Oil Company plant. Of 20,006 deadweight tons, the ship is commanded by Captain H. J. Hennessey and is under charter from the Keystone Shipping Co., of Philadelphia.

Built in the Kobe Shipyards in Japan, the black hulled monster is 572 feet in length with a beam of 75 feet and a draft of 29 feet. The tanker arrived here from Aruba in the Dutch West Indies, and at about 6 a.m. today she is expected to clear for a Texas port.

A second ship is also here for the same company, the MT Firbranch, which is taking on about 23,000 barrels of gasoline for delivery at Rimouski and Riviere Du Loup, Quebec.

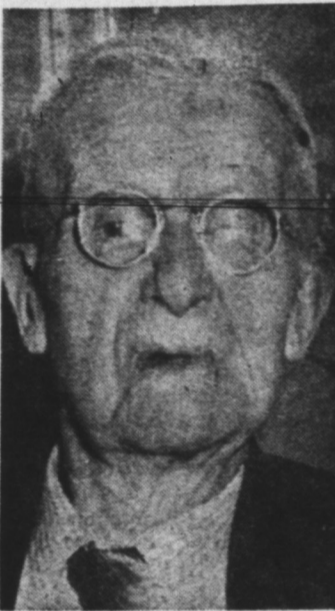
\$50 Fine Levied In Assault Case

Appearing in Queens County Magistrate's Court Friday for judgment on the charge of assault, Daniel Tweel of Charlottetown was assessed a fine of \$50 and costs, by Magistrate James B. Johnson, on a default of payment 20 days in jail.

The commitment was withheld pending the ascertainment of the police costs, the magistrate granting an adjournment for one week. The accused was specifically charged with having assaulted Archibald Murchison of Point Prim by striking him in the face with his fist.

Pleading not guilty to the charge of driving while intoxicated, Joseph Emmett Gorman-Borden, was fined \$100 and costs or 10 days in jail on the lesser count of driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol.

The crown, represented by Gerald Foster, reversed the stand taken at a previous hearing, at which time the plea of guilty to the lesser offence was not accepted. In making the acceptance, Mr. Foster stated that the crown was also asking for a stiffer penalty to be imposed due to the accused having been involved in two minor accidents a short time before his arrest. 


