THE COMING BYE ELECTION.

The Patriot authoritatively confirms the report that an election will be held in the first district of Prince County on the 25th inst. It is understood that the long vacant office of Judge of the County Court of Queen's County will not be filled until after that date. This is another of those "human devices" in which our latter-day Liberals glory. Notwithstanding the gross and glaring deception of which the Government in office stands convicted and the consequent disappointment and disgust of the people at large, an effort will be made to fool the French-Canadian electors of Tignish with the idea that if they vote for Meddie Gallant they will help their compatriot, Mr. Blanchard, to a judgeship. Let it be noted that judgeships are now held as counters in the political game! That there is no cause to hope that Mr. Blanchard's appointment will be promoted by a big vote for Meddie Gallant must be evident to anyone who reflects for a moment upon the conditions. Attorney General McDonald is Mr. Blanchard's competitor. If the Liberals be successful in the first district of Prince, the Government will be encouraged to open the third district of Queen's and the scale difficulty in the way of Mr. McDonald's appointment will be removed.

Apart from the question of the judgeship, the honest and law-abiding electors of the first district of Prince have no good reason to vote for Meddie Gallant. Though he received the benefit of a doubt in the minds of two of the judges in appeal, his shady and tortuous ways, his queer actions, on the day of the last election and subsequent thereto, must have convinced everyone that he is not a man in whom the people may safely repose confidence and trust.

As to the Government of which Meddie Gallant is the fitting supporter and champion,—can it be imagined that if the people, charmed with the idea of making "ends meet," had, eight years ago, known that there would be fastened upon the Province a debt of half a million of dollars they would have voted the Liberals in? Can it be supposed that if they could have foreseen the the prostitution of the Education office, the exploiting of the Land Office, the paralysis of the Public Works office, the scandals in respect to our public institutions, notably the hospital for the insane and the jail, the degradation of the Legislature and the electoral corruption which now prevails, they would have placed their confidence in the Liberal Administration? It cannot be imagined. Neither ought the electors, in full view of all these facts, to vote confidence in the present administration. Looking to the best interests of the Province, we hope that a strong opposition candidate will be brought forward, and that the "knavish tricks" of the Farquharsen Administration and their friends at Ottawa will be confounded.

—We regret that a sentence in THE EXAMINER'S article of yesterday, on the Asylum Scandal is, taken by itself, capable of being interpreted as meaning that we were dissatisfied with the action of the grand jury. It is needless to say that this was not intended. We had previously made plain the opinion that the grand jury's report was in accord with the facts, and heartily approved their action in ejecting the premier and other trustees from the control of the enquiry they held. While their investigation was necessarily only a partial one, it was sufficient for their purpose. But fuller enquiry might have brought out additional facts.

A GRUDGE GRATIFIED.

AFTER being upwards of a quarter of a century continuously in the Education Office of this Province, the Rev. Donald McNeill was curiously dismissed by the Farquharsen administration, and is now out of employment. No cause of dismissal has been mentioned. In point of fact, as we believe, no legitimate cause for the dismissal exists. Though he has grown gray in the public service, Mr. McNeill is now as efficient as he ever was—more so, indeed, as a result of his long experience. He has been prematurely thrown out of his employment and means of livelihood solely on account of partisanship,—to satisfy the claims of an office-seeking Liberal and to gratify a political grudge. But we entertain the hope that the revered gentleman and proved official will not linger long in idleness. A wave of indignation is rising which must ere long sweep from office and power the petty incapables whose vindictiveness is exhibited in such acts as the dismissal of experienced, impartial and capable public officials.

BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

Annual Meeting at Tryon Interest-Matters Attended to.

The annual meeting of the Baptist Association opened at Tryon on Friday of last week. Rev. E. A. McPhee, of East Point, was chosen moderator.

The time of the forenoon session was taken up with devotional exercises and the appointing of the various committees.

At the afternoon session Rev. E. J. Grant, Summerside, submitted a vigorous resolution expressing the detestation in which electioneering bribery and corruption should be held by every sincere Baptist, and urging churches and pastors to use their utmost endeavors to secure the overthrow of this disgraceful and gigantic evil, recommending prompt discipline in cases where churchmembers are found guilty of such glaring iniquity. The sentiments of the mover were unanimously adopted by the delegates.

The report on systematic beneficence was also presented by Rev. Mr. Grant. It gave a comparative statement of the denominational contributions of the churches for five or six years past.

A mass meeting in the interests of the Young People's Union was held in the evening, at which addresses were delivered by Rev. Messrs. Raymond and Warren, and several reports regarding church work were submitted.

Saturday evening was given to a consideration of the report on education presented by Rev. D. Price of Tryon.

An admirable address was made by Rev. Dr. Trotter, President of Acadia College in which the aims and successes of the Institutions at Wexvill were forcefully presented.

Rev. W. E. Hall of Halifax, N. S., followed.

The services on Sunday were all well attended.

At the forenoon session on Monday a circular letter treating of spiritual statute labor was read by Rev. W. H. Warren.

At the afternoon session the reports on missions and temperance were considered. The temperance report condemned the action of the Federal Government regarding prohibition. It also condemned the licensing of the liquor traffic.

The following resolution was moved by the Rev. E. J. Grant, Summerside, and seconded by Rev. D. Price, Tryon and unanimously adopted.

Whereas the present Dominion Government by placing the plebiscite plank in its platform when in opposition led the people to believe that if a majority of votes were cast in favor of prohibition the government would pass a prohibitory law; and

Whereas when the vote was taken there was substantial majority given in favor of prohibition; and

Whereas the government has refused to pass the law or to take any action in the matter, Therefore Resolved that the Association put on record its strong disapprobation of the course which the government is pursuing in the matter.

At the evening session Rev. A. W. Manning preached the sermon.
