## MORE I. C. R. CHANGES.

### Dismissals and Changes of Officials.

MONCTON, Aug. 21.—P. S. Archibald,  
Chief Engineer of the I. C. R., has been  
succeeded by Assistant Engineer W. B.  
McKenzie, who assumes control today.  
I. C. Burpee, formerly Divisional Engineer  
of the Bangor and Aroostock Railway,  
becomes assistant. There are rumors re-  
garding several leading officials, but  
nothing definite. It is rumored that Sati  
Agent Robinson, of St. John, is to become  
Divisional Superintendent at Truro, and  
J. J. Walker, of the Treasurer's Office at  
Moncton, is to become Divisional Superin-  
tendent at Campbellton.

### ACCIDENT TO WARSHIP.

#### British Vessel Damaged.

PLYMOUTH, Aug. 21.—The twin-screw  
torpedo boat destroyer Thresher and the  
twin-screw cruiser Pheaton, which was  
escorting the former, and which started  
yesterday for the Pacific station have  
returned to Plymouth both being badly  
damaged through the rough weather which  
they experienced. The Thresher got  
across the bows of the Pheaton and the  
coxswain of the torpedo boat Destroyer was  
knocked overboard and drowned.

### Mother and Children Burned.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 21.—The dwelling  
house of George Hudson, a farmer living  
twelve miles west of Roper City, was  
burned last night, and Mrs. Hudson and  
four children burned to death.

### The Price of Bread is Raised.

OTTAWA, Aug. 21.—Ottawa bakers have  
combined to raise the price of bread from  
ten cents to eleven cents per loaf, flour  
having gone up a dollar a barrel.

## MAKING PLACES FOR THEM.

### An Influx of Grits at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, August 21.—The cause of  
the recent influx of stalwart grits to the  
capital is explained by a batch of new  
appointments, among which are the fol-  
lowing: Dr. Bonnett the unsuccessful  
candidate in North Bruce has been pro-  
vided for with the office of police surgeon  
of Lake Tagish, on the Yukon trail; J. D.  
Macgregor, a cattle raiser of Brandon, goes  
to Klondike as Inspector of Mines, and it  
is also announced that W. Borden, Kent-  
ville, has been appointed accountant in  
Militia Department at \$2,400 a year.

### The Duke of York's Visit.

at Dublin Castle yesterday.

### CANADA ARMING HERSELF

War Materials Imported in Enormous  
Quantities.

New York, Aug. 19.—The Sun has the  
following despatch from Quebec:

Whether or not it is due to the revival  
of jingoism in Britain, to her increased  
affection for the "Lady of the Snows," to  
the enthusiasm inspired by the jubilee or  
to fear of what may result from Canada's  
remarkable stand in the matters of the  
reals and of the Klondike gold fields, cer-  
tain it is that the Dominion is signaling  
the year of the diamond jubilee by enor-  
mous importations of munitions of war  
that are creating any amount of quiet con-  
jecture and comment here.

The mere enumeration of the warlike  
stores now arriving here from England is  
calculated to prove very surprising. The  
writer has succeeded in obtaining ad-  
mittance to the several armories, stores  
and magazines in the citadel and in the  
Artillery park and was amazed by the  
quantity of valuable modern ordnance and  
ammunition that fill the place of the use-  
less and obsolete smooth-bore guns and  
muzzle-loading rifles which have occupied  
these stores since 1870.

For the old snider rifle, which was better  
than a gasp, but useless as a gun, a  
trustworthy modern weapon has been sub-  
stituted in the new Lee-Enfield rifle. Forty  
thousand of these have arrived, ready to  
arm the whole militia force, together with  
a quantity of 305 ammunition, ordered from  
England before the authorities of the  
Quebec cartridge factory had altered its  
factory to enable it to make such ammu-  
nition here. Since the making of these  
alterations and the importation of the  
necessary cordite several million cartridges  
have been turned out of the Government  
factory and are now stored at the citadel.

Six batteries of 12 pounder breech load-  
ing field guns are now ready for issue. Six  
guns complete will shortly be sent to "A"  
battalion at Kingston, and a similar  
number entrusted to "B" Battalion here.  
The remaining four batteries will be  
kept in store for the present. There is  
an ample supply of ammunition on hand  
for these guns, which is carefully piled in  
the citadel armories while the cartridges  
and limbers, 150 in all, are temporarily  
placed in the drill hall awaiting shipment.  
There are also a number of Maxim-Nor-  
denfeldt guns, which are loaded automati-  
cally and are said to fire 600 shots a  
minute. These guns are very modern and  
it is claimed that they are quite effective  
on the field. They can be placed under  
cover upon a species of tripod formed of  
the trail and two arms, the carriages  
being moved off to a distance for safer  
keeping. The recoil simply places the  
barrel, during the rapid firing, to telescope  
within a larger barrel filled with water, so  
that the firing may be continuous without  
the barrels heating and without changing  
the position of the tripod or disturbing the  
non-commissioned officer who sits com-  
fortably upon the saddle fixed to the trail  
merely turning to the right or to the left  
to follow the movements of the enemy.  
This gun consumes the 303 cordite car-  
tridges made in the Government factory  
here.

The quick-firing Hotchkiss 6-pounder  
3.35 guns are among the newest and those  
that take the eye most. Both the gun and  
the ammunition are very attractive in ap-  
pearance and are said to do marvellous execu-  
tion. The Hotchkiss is a fixture suitable  
for inland forts or late shores, but moves  
on a pivot, and is fired with great rapidity.  
The ammunition, consisting of cordite,  
neatly put up in brass coil, somewhat  
thicker than a man's wrist, with the  
6 pound shell and detonator attached  
might be supposed, when fired  
off, to cause an enormous rebound to the  
gun after so powerful a discharge, but as  
a matter of fact it is fired from the  
shoulder of a man who remains in the  
same position during the quick firing,  
except that by a slight touch he moves  
the gun upon its pivot in the de-  
sired direction.

Almost each succeeding steamship brings  
out new stores and Col. Forre the super-  
intendent keeps a foreman and more than  
a dozen storemen occupied now at the  
citadel in receiving and issuing newly-  
arrived and modern war material. These  
are of course quite independent of the em-  
ployees of the Government cartridge factory  
who are working on full time, and turning  
out an immense quantity of ammunition.

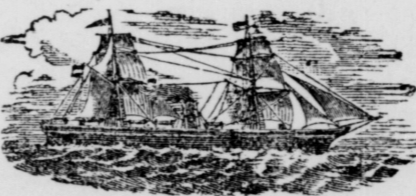
