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GOLD AND OPIUM IN VOYED

Nine Canadians Caught In Indonesian Smuggling

By DAVE MCINTOSH OTTAWA (CP)—Nine Canadian citizens, seven military and two civilian personnel, have been caught smuggling opium and gold in Indonesia, Prime Minister Diefenbaker disclosed Monday in the Commons.

The nine were serving on Canada's delegation to the International Trade Supervisory Commission in Indonesia. The investigation is continuing. No names were given.

Mr. Diefenbaker informed the Commons that the two civilians, made clerks in the external affairs department, have signed statements admitting they smuggled opium and gold for a Chinese from one city to another in Indonesia.

Both men have been suspended from the public service of Canada with leave to substitute the prime minister said the smuggling activities were discovered late last year.

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WHERE-TO-FIND IT

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West Kest Site Proposed For Gov't Office Building



The entire block of land on which the West Kest School is situated in Charlottetown has been chosen as the site for a new provincial government office building by a government committee appointed to study the feasibility of a building that would house all government offices.

Provincial secretary J. David Stewart, committee chairman, tabled the committee's findings, titled "Feasibility Study on a New Provincial Office Building," in the Legislature last night.

Mr. Stewart said that some time ago he had given notice that a resolution dealing with legislation to set up a Crown building corporation for the province would be introduced at the current session.

"The present feasibility study," he said, "is being tabled so that the House will have an opportunity to study it before the resolution, which deals with the proposed building, is introduced."

Recommended by the committee was that the Montreal firm of architects who won the Canada-wide contest for the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Building, be considered as architect for the new provincial building.

ENLARGED AREA URGED The committee recommended that the area around the Charlottetown Armories site as a possible future site for a new court house and that the Curial home be secured by option for future expansion.

Included in the site recommended by the committee is the area bounded by Kent, Rockford, Fitzroy and West Streets. Also recommended was that the province acquire the block bounded by West Kent School block and bounded by Fitzroy.
