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STEAMSHIP CUT
LONDON, May 3.—The Cunard Line announces that accommodations on certain steamers plying between the United States and European ports hitherto devoted exclusively to first class passengers, have been transferred for use of cabin and second class passengers. The rates for these accommodations on all lines will be approximately one half the first class rates. Reductions have been agreed upon by all North Atlantic lines for westbound passengers beginning May 1 in the shape of reduced surcharges to equalize the difference in exchange.

"SIMON PURES" SAYS SWEENEY

ST. JOHN, May 2.—Thomas K. Sweeney, who was on Saturday elected at Amherst as president of the newly formed Athletic Association for control of hockey and baseball in the Maritime Provinces, stoutly denied today that the organization was an outlaw body. He said it was purely amateur and the intention was to have the same standing as the present amateur skating association. According to the constitution of A. A. U. of C. he said four or more clubs could join together and apply for regulations to any particular brand of sport. A new body was proposed asking authority regulating hockey and baseball.

GALLON OF FUEL FOR 300 MILES.

SYRACUSE, May 1.—Three hundred miles by an automobile on one gallon of fuel costing five and one-half cents. That is the claim H. H. Elmer, treasurer and general manager of the Globe Malleable Iron and Steel Company of this city, makes for an engine designed by himself, revealed to the directorate of the company at its annual meeting here today. Internationally-known engineering experts, including Arthur West, chief engineer of the Bethlehem Steel Corporation have inspected Mr. Elmer's engine, and are said to have pronounced it hundreds of years ahead of times. Three full-sized models were tested before the directors today. One of the models, a one-cylinder, three-horsepower engine, ran continuously for 18 hours on one and one-quarter pints of fuel, the directors stated.

The fuel used is oil, either mineral, animal or vegetable. No kerosene or carburetor is used. One of Mr. Elmer's models has attained a speed of from 2,500 to 3,000 revolutions a minute he claims. The principle of the discovery is based on the chemistry of oil, according to Mr. Elmer.

Doyle's "Fairies" Are Flapper Dolls

Explanations of Spiritualist Photographers by Montreal Man

NEW YORK, May 2.—The "fairies" which appear in photographs which Sir Arthur Conan Doyle has declared to be of undisputed spirit origin, are merely little flapper dolls with bobbed hair, ultra-modern skirts and wings which are anatomically impossible, dolls which may be purchased in any London toy shop. This is the assertion made by James Black, of Montreal, in an article printed in the Tribune today. The paper, in publishing Mr. Black's explanation of the origin of the photographs, declares it does so without vouching for the statements it contains and "merely as a criticism of news value upon a matter which has been brought prominently before the public."

Sir Arthur did not display the photographs in New York, but he publicly described them here and expressed his belief in their authenticity. They were taken by two girls at Bradford, Yorkshire, and show fairies and goblins of the conventional picture book type. Mr. Black declares the girls who took the photographs were Elsie Wright, who was 17 years of age at the time, and her cousin, five years younger. Miss Wright, he declares, was employed by a Bradford photographer and was an expert with the camera. The fairy photographs always were taken by these "children" when alone. Attempts to secure fairy pictures when others accompanied them invariably failed.

Calling attention to the fact that the shape of the fairies in the photographs are no more ethereal looking than the figure of the girl, Mr. Black says: "They are the fairies of our youth dressed down to date, with bobbed hair and some in modish evening gowns that would be the delight of the modern flapper. Just the same little folks you can buy in a toy store—if you have the price."

The staff photographer of the London Daily News, the writer states, took a series of fairy pictures which are similar to those taken by Elsie Wright in every detail. And he afterwards showed the original fairies which appeared in his photographs, little toy figures which he made himself.
