BADLY OFF.—The Pioneer states that a letter was received from Quebec by the steamboat officials at Summerside a few days ago addressed to "M. A Starr, Esq., Point du Chene," wanting to get 150 barrels of oysters.

ISLANDERS INJURED.—The Bangor Commercial, referring to the late accident on the Maine Central Railway, says that John Elworth, of Charlottetown, had his leg cut and bruised; and Edward Revens, also of Charlottetown, was hurt about the head and body. Charles Deagle, who also hails from the island, had his leg cut and bruised.

DASTARDLY INCENDIARISM.—At West River, St. Mary's, Guysboro, N. S., four barns with their contents were burnt to the ground in one night last week. In some of them cattle were destroyed. It was evidently the work of one or more scoundrels. The burning began in the early part of the night. One man sat up till two o'clock watching his barn, but after he retired it was destroyed.

HEAVY GALE.—A gale from the north and northeast set in about midnight on Saturday, and still continues. The average velocity of the wind since the storm began is twenty-two miles an hour, with occasional spurts of forty miles, lasting two or three minutes. The rainfall, which has been almost continuous since the storm set in, is about two and a quarter inches deep on the level. The barometer, however, is rising, indicating clearing, colder weather.

PROPOSED FOOTBALL TOUR.—The Halifax Mail says: The football team in connection with the West Riding Regiment are trying to perfect arrangements for a tour of the Maritime Provinces. Should they be successful in doing so, the team, which is a very strong one, will visit Windsor, New Glasgow, Pictou, St. John and Charlottetown. The West Riding club are anxious to meet the celebrated club of Prince Edward Island.

CHAPPELLE'S ALMANAC.—This valuable annual for 1891 is in press. In addition to the vast amount of information always found therein, the publisher this year will add a list of three thousand words often mispronounced, and of words as to which a choice of pronunciation is allowed, compiled by the very best authority. The object is to make the almanac an indispensable hand-book.

FOUND DROWNED.—The Summerside papers report that on Thursday morning last the lifeless body of Frederick Adams, said to belong to Portland, Maine, and who has been cook on board the Katie Stewart, now undergoing repairs at Read's wharf, was found floating near the vessel. The man had been missing since Tuesday, 30th September, and was supposed to have deserted. An inquest was held and it was brought out in evidence that the deceased had been drinking through the day of Tuesday the 30th ult, and at night when attempting to get on board his vessel, he had fallen off the plank and drowned. The deceased was about 37 years of age.

THE FATHER MATTHEW CENTENNIAL.—The centennial anniversary of the birth of Father Matthew was celebrated at St. John on Thursday by a huge procession of the different Catholic total abstinence societies of the city and vicinity, numbering eleven in all. Over 1,000 people and seven bands were in the procession, making it by far the greatest temperance demonstration ever witnessed in St. John. A meeting of delegates from the societies was held in the afternoon, at which the Catholic total abstinence union of New Brunswick was organized and officers elected. In the evening a grand concert was held in the Institute, at which R. A. Quigley delivered an address urging all Catholics to embrace total abstinence.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Swindlers Arrested.

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.

Cornelia VeMiller and Priscilla Field were arrested Saturday afternoon and locked up at police headquarters. Detective sergeant Golden, accompanied by Wm. R. Hoar of the British consulate, received from U. S. Comm'r Shields a warrant of extradition against the women. The warrant charges the women with receiving stolen property to the amount of £30,000. The particulars are withheld by the authorities, but from the counsel for the women it is learned that they are the wives of Field & Co., who failed a month ago with liabilities amounting to £100,000. The women are said to have come to the country with funds that should properly have been applied to the liquidation of a portion of the debts of the insolvent firm. The firm is said to have been a large business, paying 25 per cent. on all moneys left with them. The doors of the institution closed the last part of August, and soon after the wives of the two members of the firm sailed for this country. Later they received drafts on the banking house of Brown Bros. & Co. for 95,500 pounds. Other drafts followed, but Brown, Bros. & Co. refused to honor them, having received a cablegram from London advising them not to do so.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Oct. 12.

A postal packet arrangement has been effected between Canada and Japan, and will go into effect immediately.

Six thousand feet of space has already been applied for in the Jamaica Exhibition and applications are still pouring in.

The Minister of Customs is expected to return here to-morrow from his trip to the Northwest. He is in prime health.

A Deplorable Error.

LONDON, Oct. 11.

Mr. Gladstone has written as follows to a friend on the subject of the McKinley Bill: "I look upon the Act as a deplorable error, which will be attended with the most severe and cruel consequences to innocent people." In a subsequent paragraph he says "I will speak further on the matter in Midlothian."

A Beneficent Testator.

MONTREAL, Oct. 12.

The late James McCready left an estate worth half a million dollars, of which \$20,000 goes to St. Patrick's Church and \$30,000 to charities, of which \$6,000 is in Protestant institutions. The testator was a Roman Catholic.

Warrants for Dillon and O'Brien.

DUBLIN, Oct. 12.

Warrants for the arrest of Dillon and O'Brien arrived at the castle Saturday afternoon, but were not given to the detectives and no steps will be taken by the Government to ask for the arrest of Dillon and O'Brien in the United States.

A Dying Judge.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.

There is little change in Justice Miller's condition since early this morning. The Justice's respiration has greatly increased, and his throat is rapidly filling with mucus, which will ultimately result in death. His physician states he has been dying all day, and that the end is not far off.

Disastrous Fire.

MONTREAL, Oct. 12.

Pillow, Hersey & Co.'s rolling mills was burned yesterday morning, entailing a loss of \$75,000 and throwing 400 men out of employment. The loss is fully covered by insurance.

To Meet at Rome.

ROME, Oct. 11.

His Holiness the Pope has summoned the four archbishops and the senior suffragan bishop of each Province of Ireland to attend him at Rome on the 1st of November.

Condign Punishment.

SHERBROOKE, Que., Oct. 12.

Renie LaMontain was found guilty yesterday of murdering his brother-in-law, Napoleon Michell, in July, 1888, and sentenced to be hanged on the 19th December.
