Summerside Council Passes Resolution Concerning Poll Tax

A resolution approved by the Summerside Town Council at a special meeting yesterday at noon petitions the Provincial Government to amend the Summerside Incorporation Act so that a poll tax may be levied on all female residents over 21 years of age. The same resolution asks the Government to further amend the Incorporation Act so that the borrowing power of the town may be increased by an additional \$475,000.00 by way of a bond issue, and an additional \$500,000.00 by way of bank overdraft. The resolution was moved by Coun. J. L. MacDougall and seconded by Coun. Dr. H. E. Clark. Following is the text of the resolution: "Whereas the Town Council of the Town of Summerside have expended and plan to expend a considerable sum of money for general permanent works and other capital expenditures, and it is necessary to provide therefor; "Be it resolved that the Town Council of the Town of Summerside petition the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Prince Edward Island, in session, to amend section 36 and 68B of the Summerside Incorporation Act, 1903, to provide for said poll tax assessment by adding the first line of each section referred to the words "and female"; to issue 20 year serial debentures for an amount not exceeding \$475,000 in addition to any amount heretofore authorized, to pay capital expenditures made by way of general permanent works, and to retire overdraft caused by way of said capital expenditures; and further resolved that the Town of Summerside petition the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Prince Edward Island, in session, for authority to borrow from any bank or banks, by way of overdraft, on capital account for possible anticipated capital expenditures, a sum not exceeding \$500,000.00 in addition to any amount heretofore authorized. "And whereas to assist the town in financing, it is deemed advisable to levy a poll tax on all female residents of the town of Summerside over 21 years of age; "Be it further resolved that the said Town Council petition the legislative assembly of the Province of Prince Edward Island, in session, to amend section 36 and 68B of the Summerside Incorporation Act, 1903, to provide for said poll tax assessment by adding the first line of each section referred to the words "and female";

As the black wings of the three folded to their sides the Winchester spoke her little piece. All 3 wilted as if mowed down with a scythe. The 4th took off in a hurry but the left barrel looked after him. Not one of the 4 moved from the spot they dropped....a pair of ponderous wings gave with a feeble flap and a black neck writhed for a moment and was still. I stood and viewed the 4 black mounds on the stubble and it slowly dawned on me that we had our required 6 geese. Such luck seldom comes to a goose hunter....maybe once or twice in a lifetime. They were real December geese so fat and heavy their necks creaked when lifted from the stubble. 3 were geese of the year and the 4th was an older and heavier bird. My companions couldn't believe their eyes when they returned. I tried to be nonchalant about the whole affair but my chest measurement increased slightly. While we stowed the geese in the cars a black blob on a distant hillside stubble turned out to be another goose....either mine or the Bankers....we didn't argue the point I took one bird home with me...a chunky, deep breast ed gosling....and my wife and I agreed that, maybe barring one shot in the days shortly after we commenced housekeeping, it was the best wildgoose ever carved on our table. The season closed on the 9th and the geese were driven out by a freezeup on the 11th. As the drifts rattled against the frost-lashed window panes and a December wind lashed the eaves I tucked a napkin in my belt and watched the tender, short grained slices of breast meat fill beneath the carving knife and gazing. Yes, I have kept another and wished that I had kept another going. Yes, I have no kick coming on what old 1955 dished out to me in the Great Outdoor game of hunting.
