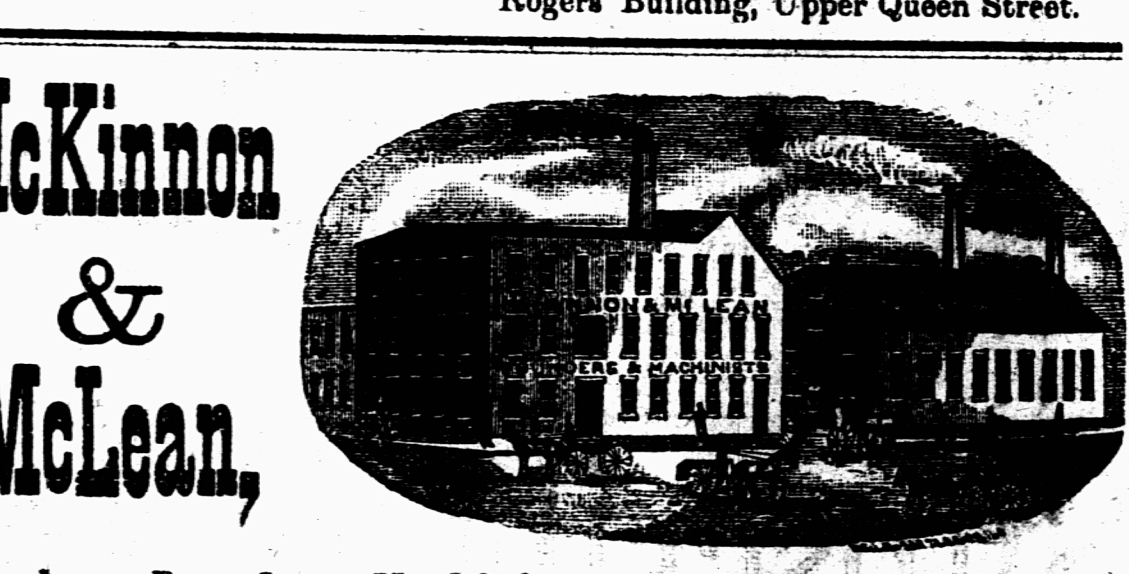

## The Saloon's Defiance.

I've dared you in the city, I've defied you on the plain; Go, find the law I have not broken, And will not break again. I scorn your Prohibition, I scorn your Sabbath day; For greed is stamped upon my heart, A god's my motto cry: I care not for your quarrel, And I care not for your law; But 'Till I sink beneath my slave, 'Till I sink beneath my law.

**Badly Yoked.**  
Francis Willard says: "So long as saloon keepers and saintly distillers and doctors of divinity, brewers and brethren in the church, walk side by side to the ballot box, and put in the same ticket, so long the liquor traffic will continue to hold its own."

**A Peculiar Case.**  
Kingston, Ont., Dec. 15.—Thomas Welch was released from the asylum here under peculiar circumstances. It was 7 years since he went mad and was sent to Rockwood. He never spoke a word until the morning of his release, all communications with the keeper or others being in writing. While working on a building at the asylum on Saturday, Welch suddenly turned to superintendent Clarke's wife who happened to be standing near, and said: "It is a fine morning, ma'am," and immediately his sanity seemed to return.

**It Must Come.**  
Bishop Spaulding, one of the master spirits in the Roman Catholic church in the States, has recently said: "In fact, one great question that is going to be forced into politics—we may sneer at it now, but it is going to come—is the question of Prohibition. Mark my words; the saloon in America has become a public nuisance. The liquor trade, by meddling with politics and corrupting politics, has become a menace and a danger. Those who think and those who love America, and those who love liberty are going to bring this national question into politics more and more."

**A Temperance Explorer.**  
It has been over and over again demonstrated that the great travellers who are subjected to the greatest exposures of cold are total abstainers. Dr. Nansen, the noted Arctic explorer, just now, the most noted of Arctic explorers, his last wonderful trips in the Arctic regions, over regions of ice lasting weeks, are yet the sensation of the day. He is now fitting up a North Pole expedition. It may not be generally known that he, too, is a total abstainer. His Arctic adventures, all his hardships without alcoholic stimulants. In his recent very interesting book he says:—"The only use I ever made of brandy during my tour through Greenland was to melt the snow when I wanted water. It does that admirably."

**Choked by a Spectre.**  
Kingston, Ont., Dec. 10.—An Englishman named King has had rare experiences at Foxboro, with ghosts. He says his evil genius is a woman of medium height, with fair complexion and long flowing hair, and a reddish light. Over a week ago King met her and came home with a lame wrist. His companion could see no one, but his contortions indicated pain. King left his companions by the roadside last Thursday, and a few minutes later his cries brought them to him. He was lying unconscious. His tongue was swollen and hanging from his mouth. His neck bore marks of violence, his actions of fingers being apparent. For three days King could not articulate. When he could talk, he said that his assailant was the mysterious female. There is consternation in the village. King is very intelligent and not of vicious habits.

**Careful Cullings.**  
In Belgium, where drunkenness and not drinking is regarded as the crime, there is a capital law which might well be adopted in America. Whenever a producer and handler of liquor in this country, which enables them to be a Republican administration to their will, where they cannot control a Democratic House of Representatives, as in the extension of the bonded period, is threatening enough, without further concentrating and solidifying that power.

Sixth, high license proved to be a failure in practice. The estimate of the fact may easily be multiplied by one who cares enough for the facts to investigate. It fails to answer the expectations of its friends in every particular in which good results are claimed for it.

In many cases the number of drinking-houses is only slightly diminished, or not at all.  
2. Unlicensed houses are not closed, because as Dr. Herrick Johnson says: (a) The house of the liquor dealer will not divide against itself. (b) The higher liquor dealers need these low saloons to take their refuse. (c) These negroes and the trade live in glass houses—they do not dare to throw stones.

3. It does not improve the character of the dealers, as is claimed.  
Seventh, high license is wrong in principle.

In refusing to accept high license we are, therefore, neither foolish nor inconsistent. We are doing only what honesty and conscience demand. We want our governments, state and national, to come up beside those of China and Madagascar, which refuse to derive a revenue from that which degrades and destroys their people. We want state and national prohibition. It does prohibit. While liquor dealers move earth and hell to postpone and defeat it, we need no stronger reasons for pushing it. The evidence is complete, the argument is invincible, the conclusion is thundered and destroyed by conscience. Let us bring in the verdict and close the case. High license will not do, for that which is wrong in principle cannot be good policy, and a question is never settled until it is settled right.

**Thousands Starving.**  
Distressing details of the famine in the Northwestern States continue to reach the east, notwithstanding the most strenuous exertions of the boomers to have them suppressed.

"The Commission appointed by the governor of Nebraska to enquire into distress in that state caused by failure of crops, has reported that in twelve counties there are 10,000 families in danger of actual starvation and requiring assistance. The governor does not wish to appeal to outsiders for aid, but thinks that legislation will be able to grant sufficient relief."

"TOPEKA, Kan., Dec. 10.—The railroads to-day agreed to free provisions to Northwestern Kansas free of charge. In eight or ten counties grouped in that section there is much suffering, there being as many as 6,000 families who are in need and have nothing but their bare land. Owing to the dry season no corn or wheat was raised, and the indebtedness already incurred has been and will be added to the banks and merchants who have carried the inhabitants until they can do so no more. A large proportion of the population abandoned their lands last spring and summer and moved east, which materially reduces the amount of destitution."
