Nuclear Punch Seen For China

PARIS (Reuters)—A French specialist on nuclear problems said here that China's several hundred lyushin-20 jet aircraft meant that its atomic bomb "can fairly soon become of military significance."

Reserve Gen. Pierre Gallot, writing in the December issue of the semi-official National Defence Review, said the aircraft "in effect represent a vehicle capable of giving Peking's atomic arm a singularly intimidating potential of destruction."

The lyushin-20s, furnished by Russia, could only be intended to carry the bomb, Gallot wrote, since China does not possess a sufficiently large number of them to be used as a conventional war.

Ancient City of Pompei Slowly Being Unearthed

POMPEI, Italy (CP) - Re-lazed and carefree, a man prepares for a hot bath. Outside, a bustling town of 25,000 goes about its business. Traffic in the streets is heavy, but in the square people stroll without fear of accident. Vehicles are not allowed in the square.

The room housing the bath is pleasantly warm. Warm air circulates through the walls and floor, the latest in central heating.

Piping hot and icy cold water flows through lead pipes and can be turned off and on with a simple twist of the faucet.

A modern sense of No. that was Pompei 2,000 years ago. Piece by piece, year by year, this ancient city buried by a mighty eruption of the volcano Vesuvius in 79 A.D. is being uncovered and put on view.

Three-fifths of the city that once covered a fertile hillside of four square miles now has been dug out from under 25 feet of volcanic rubble. The painstaking work to unearth the remainder continues under state supervision.

Vesuvius has been relatively quiet in recent years and while most grade-school students know of the destruction of Pompei, with an estimated loss of 1,000 lives, few realize that a much heavier toll resulted in a 181 eruption. The toll then was 16,000.

Quebec Man Acquitted; His Duplessis Friend

QUEBEC (CP)—Brash, tough Gerald (Gerry) Martineau, 62, acquitted today on a charge of defrauding the Quebec government of \$34,600, was for years treasurer of the Union Nationale party.

Once a power figure in the party, he has gradually slipped into the background after the 1959 death of Premier Maurice Duplessis, the party's founder. Mr. Martineau held the party purse strings from 1944 to 1962. And there were reports he controlled a political war chest of \$60,000,000 and made an annual trip to Switzerland to bank money.

In those years, he said, he had two secretaries typing out recommendations for the suppliers who poured into his Lower Town office - equipment firm.

But he denies the party ever had millions and says his trip to Geneva were on business, and a Liberal senator was unsuccessful on the same boat.

He was perhaps the best friend of Premier Duplessis, a man he thought of as a father. The flag that covers the Duplessis casket stands at his office door, and near his desk is a portrait of the premier. Photos of Le Chef cover the walls.

He speaks to the legislative council, to which Mr. Duplessis appointed him in 1946, he reports a familiar figure at the buildings at Laval University.

The speeches are those of a traditionalist who sees "dangerous innovations" and "leftist" behind legislation like this year's bill to set up an education department.

He opposed it as "a denial of the past" and of the work done by Quebec's religious communities under the old system.

"It was the system I knew, it is the system my grandfathers knew and it is the only system I wish for the children of our province."

Steel Contract Bargaining Seen Tough In 1965

CLEVELAND (AP) - "Look for some rough, tough bargaining with labor unions in the year ahead," the editor of Steel magazine has predicted.

The outline of a pattern, "let the first strike later" - can be seen in the recent auto industry battles. The National Metal-Working Workers' Union, which has been in a long-term settlement on economic issues, explained Campbell.

The stoppages disrupted production for several months and resulted in costly concessions in local work rules and wages.

Further development of the pattern is noted in "inside" battles now shaping up in other big unions, wrote Campbell. As an example, he cited the bid of I. W. Abel, secretary-treasurer of the United Steel-Workers Union, to unseat union president David J. McDonald in an election set for Feb. 9.

Campbell said he believes "the surge of insurgency stems from the belief of local chairmen that national leadership has become too far removed from the rank and file. Whether or not reforms are successful, the effect of their insurgency will be more militancy at the bargaining table."

MAKE BIG PROMISES
