The new White Star steamer Oceanic, the largest ship in the world, arrived at Liverpool on Saturday from Belfast, Ireland, where she was built. The Oceanic is to sail from Liverpool to New York on her maiden voyage on September 6. Her dimensions are: Length, 704 feet; beam, 72 feet; draught, 26 feet. She registers 17,000 tons. Her engines are expected to develop 45,000 horse power. Her keel was laid on March 12, 1897, and she was launched on January 16th last. The White Star company believe she will make the transatlantic voyage in five days, and their aim will be to secure a regular Wednesday morning arrival both in New York and Liverpool. Captain John G. Cameron, late of the Teutonic, Commodore of the White Star fleet, will be in command of the Oceanic.
