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Sentenced To Terms Totalling Ten Years

Sentences of four years and three months in Dorchester Penitentiary on charges of breaking, entering and theft in connection with a break in a railway car, and breaking and entering with intent to commit theft in connection with a break into the store of Reddin Bros. were imposed on Elmer Doucette, this city, in Queen's County Court Judge, C. St. Clair Trainor yesterday.

The two actions arose when Doucette was committed to the Supreme Court by Stipendiary Magistrate E. M. Martin, Q.C., on a breaking and entering charge when the drugstore of Reddin Bros. was entered last July. He was released on bail and while out was charged with breaking and entering and theft in a railway car at the C.N.R. station on September 8.

The accused elected speedy trial on both charges before Judge Trainor and they were heard yesterday. He pleaded not guilty to the railway charge, but was convicted, and pleaded guilty to the charge regarding Reddin Bros.

Cites Previous Record In passing sentence after a plea for leniency by his counsel, Judge Trainor referred to his long record of previous convictions on similar charges and said that while none of the charges was serious in itself, insofar as the value of goods stolen was concerned, the record set would be a pattern of conduct which could not be ignored.

The Judge told the prisoner that the various legal provisions were made to protect society and reminded him that had the Crown elected to invoke a new section of the Criminal Code he might have been confined for the rest of his natural life. In this connection

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To Attend Tourist Meeting In Vancouver

Ontario Gov't Seeks To Settle Gold Mine Strikes TORONTO, (CP)—Premier Frost of Ontario indicated Tuesday that a provincial government will make a full-scale attempt to end the strike of 5,000 miners at six Timmins gold mines.

Following a meeting with Timmins area municipal officials, he appealed to the 1,700 men at the Hollinger mine to return to work and submit their grievances to arbitration procedure.

He called upon the presidents of the Hollinger, McIntyre and Hallor mines to meet government officials Wednesday in new mediation talks and indicated the federal government may be asked to enter the dispute.

The United Steelworkers of America (CIO-CCL) has struck six mines in the Timmins area, McIntyre, Hollinger, Hallor, Delnite, Preston East Dome and Broullan-Preaf, and the Noranda mine across the Ontario-Quebec border. At issue are questions of union security, wages and hours.

The town of Timmins is completely dependent on the area's 12 gold mines. There are some 40,000 people in the area which faces economic collapse should the strikes, six mines are involved, be long-continued. There is a possibility of strikes at three more mines where grievances now are under conciliation procedure.
