Red In New Flag Is Ensign Shlag

OTTAWA (CP) - Canada's proposed new maple leaf flag retains one characteristic of the Red Ensign - the red of the ground or field of the ensign.

Herman Batten, chairman of the Commons flag committee which recommended the flag design, said Tuesday the committee agreed that the red in the new flag should be the red of the Red Ensign.

He said this will be the shade of red for the flag's single maple leaf on a white ground, with the red panels at either side of the flag being the same shade of red.
