THE ROYAL SALUTE.—A royal salute of twenty-one guns will be fired from Fort Edward at noon on Monday, by a detachment from No. 2 Company, Garrison Artillery, under command of Captain Moore. At 3 p. m., a salute will be fired by No. 4 Battery, G. A., under command of Captain Brennan.

MOGILL EXAMINATIONS.—The results of the summer session examinations of the McGill Medical Academy were posted a few days ago. It is pleasing to observe that W. W. Wickham, of Summerside, leads his class in hygiene and that St. Clair Gallant, of Charlottetown, takes first place in second class honors in the same subject.

LIGHTNING'S WORK.—The house of Mr. Kinney, at Bridgewater Centre, Me., was struck by lightning during the shower on Monday. A dog lay under the table and two small children were sitting on the floor beside him. The dog was instantly killed by the bolt, and one of the children was thrown over backward and partially stunned.

THE MONTH'S RECORD.—During the month of June, ending to-day, there were eight convictions at the Police Court for drunkenness; four convictions for assault; one for breach of the Post Office Act; three for malicious injuries to property; three for nuisance; one for breach of the Liquor Regulation Act. One assault case dismissed, also one nuisance, one breach of the Liquor Regulation Act, and two were larceny cases. The receipts of the Court, including doct's tax, amounted to \$437.

The Bishop will administer the Sacrament of Confirmation at 3 p. m. Festival Evensong at 7 o'clock with sermon by the Lord Bishop. A Solemn Te Deum will be sung before the Altar after the sermon.
