Sees Industrial Activity Here Levelling Off ST. ANDREWS - BY THE SEA, N.B., June 2 - (CP) - Over-all economic and industrial activity in Canada has reached its peak and is levelling off, president W.J. Borrie of Vancouver told the annual meeting of the Investment Dealer's Association of Canada today.

He suggested in his annual address it is "unlikely that defence preparations will proceed as scheduled" unless another "hot spot" such as Korea appears. Canada's dynamic expansion program undoubtedly had been accelerated by the defence program, but a sense of urgency no longer existed. "It is reasonable to assume, therefore, that the world price level of commodities, metals, etc.,

The chairman at the opening was Dr. Frank MacMillan who introduced Mr. Fremont Archer, president of the Club. Mr. Archer offered the appreciation of the members to all who had helped the club to carry on its work. He mentioned several of the projects undertaken, including summer camps for the underprivileged boys and girls, and told the gathering "in spending your money here you are losing nothing. You really gain because you are helping the children."

Following the opening by the Lieutenant Governor the president introduced City Councillor P. C. McCormac, representing the Mayor of the City. In offering a civic welcome to those present the Councillor said that the Kinsmen were doing a noble work. Those who do not belong to a service club, he said, were missing a great deal both personally and in what they could give to their community.

Shoot-To-Kill Orders Extended By Reds To Border Of West Berlin

BERLIN, June 12 - (AP) - The shoot-to-kill security measures the Russian zone government instituted on the frontier between East and West Germany May 26 were ordered today to include the border around West Berlin.

The deputy prime minister, Walter Ulbricht, signed the order to the People's Police, already squeezing hard upon the Allied sectors with roadblocks and kidnappings. It was another Communist move in reprisal for the signing of West Germany's peace contract and military alliance with the West that Red leaders say will mean civil war.

Among other developments: The Western Big-Three high commissioners served notice that Britain, the United States and France are ready to counter new cold-war attacks and rush economic aid to the encircled city of 2,200,000 that lies 100 miles behind the Soviet army's front line in Europe. The Russians rejected an American protest against the wounding of a United States military policeman on the Berlin border by a Communist policeman June 4. The Russians said he had penetrated East German territory and that only a warning shot was fired in the air.

In a note to the Soviet Control Commission, British Maj.-Gen. C. F. Coleman demanded the immediate return of three West Berliners, two of them newspaper men, kidnapped Tuesday from the British sector by a Russian-commanded police patrol. The renewed aim of Ulbricht's new decree is "to protect the interests of the population of the (East) German Democratic Republic and to make impossible the entrance of enemy elements in its territory." Simple violators are to be imprisoned for up to two years and fined up to 2,000 marks (\$480); others face greater punishment and perhaps death.
