undisputed. Mayor, issued recommendation of the building now charged being an obstruction on the removed from Dorchester street present position. That license gave tenants a limited time of four to move this building from its former site on Haviland St. to its proposed site on Haviland St. apparently a reasonable time, and certainly in interest of the public a necessary limitation of time during which the streets should be obstructed. That time expired on the 10th day of July inst., and the Mayor guided by a resolution of the City Council, has refused to extend the time or renew the license. This building is now, therefore, an undoubted nuisance and obstruction. It is sought now to remedy this by a prosecution before me for breach of the City By-law. The only by-law which can be construed to apply to this case is one giving permission to the Mayor to grant licenses for the removal of buildings. I find no provision giving me power to punish summarily in a case like this, when under a license a building is placed on the streets, and remains there after the time mentioned in the license. It is probably never intended that such a building should be an obstruction to the streets.

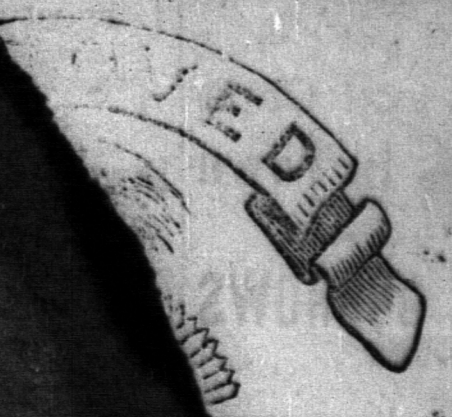
