lish North America Act, but that of the Order-in-Council admitting the Province into the Union on July 1, 1873. In that document certain solemn guarantees were given by Canada to the Province of Prince Edward Island on the strength of which we entered the Union.

THE RAILWAY STRIKE

"The recent strike of the employees of the company entailed a complete interruption of the service for a period of nine days (and potentially for a much longer period) when communication between our Province and the mainland was neither continuous nor, in fact maintained at all."

DEFINITION NECESSARY

"The report would appear to indicate that many of the Provinces placed certain sections under Category 5 as concerning fundamental rights because they were uncertain as to what the anticipated definition of Category 4 would be. We feel that before proceeding with the first consideration at this conference should be to arrive at some agreement on the definition of that category."

"In the emergency a special session of the Legislature was summoned and our stand made clear by a resolution unanimously adopted, which was forwarded to the Federal authorities."
