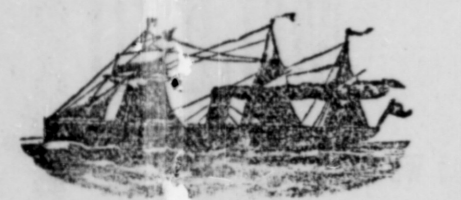

**BLACK DIAMOND LINE**

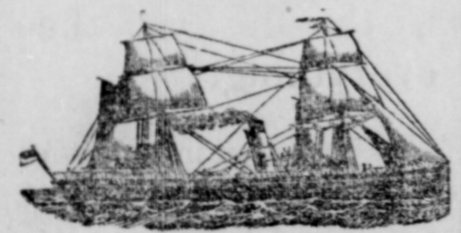

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Senator Burrows upon retiring from a conference with President McKinley today said that everything was moving along smoothly and well.

"What we want now is Porto Rico," he said, "and we ought to have it too," he added.

"Will it be soon," was added.

"Yes" was the Senator's reply, "probably in a day or two."

WASHINGTON, May 5.—The Spanish authorities are busily engaged laying mines in the harbor of San Juan in Porto Rico in order to defend it against any possible attack by the ships of the American fleet.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Several of the United States warships are looking for the Spanish transport ship Alfonso XIII, which is now on the way to Havana, conveying 1100 soldiers, a quantity of supplies and nearly half a million dollars in money.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—The American troops are being massed at Tampa, Florida, but no decisive movement will be made by them until after the expected naval battle has been fought.

NEW YORK, May 5.—An unconfirmed despatch received here says that the first expedition sent by the United States Government to Cuba has made two landings, after a sharp encounter with the Spanish forces.

MADRID, May 5.—All Spain is in an uproar. The rioting on the part of the people still continues and is spreading to the other cities besides Madrid. The condition of affairs throughout Spain is simply terrifying.

In Madrid, last night, riotous mobs gathered nearly everywhere. The troops called out to restore order found it impossible to disperse the rioters and had to fire upon them.

Even the Royal Family is not safe from the fury of the mob and are said to be on the point of flight from Madrid.

The leaders of the Republican Party are planning the formation of a republic to follow the present revolution.

The Carlists are acting a wily part, and are making every endeavour to carry out a scheme to set Don Carlos, the Spanish Pretender on the throne, and reestablish the ancient dynasty.

But the most active of all the revolutionary parties are the Weylerites and the Robledoists. These are highly incensed against the present Government for not prosecuting the war with more vigor, and blame the Ministers for the reverses that Spain has already suffered. This party demands that a fiercer policy be inaugurated, that the war be carried on without any more delay, and are in favor of having the strong-handed Weyler made a Dictator, to be uncontrolled by authority of the Ministry or the Cortes.

The outbreaks in the provinces of Spain are said to be simply awful. In Gijon one of the northern seaports the rioters actually faced the troops called out to put them down. The troops fired upon them. A dozen of the rioters fell but the leaders rallied the mob who returned to the attack and were not subdued until the artillery were called out and cleared the streets.

Later on, a part of the artillery force went over to the rioters and joining forces planted their cannon in such a position as to command the fortifications.

At Talavera de la Reina a great mob marched upon the railroad station, and dispersed the civil guards. They then razed the station, and set fire to the railway cars. Not content with this they then set fire to the residences of obnoxious officials, and looted and burned a Jesuit institution forcing the priests to flee for their lives.

At Malaga the mob overpowered the guards and looted the shops. A bomb was thrown on board the British steam yacht of Cloumel owned by James Wilkinson, of London, as she lay at a pier. The yacht hurriedly put to sea. She was slightly damaged.

LONDON, May 5.—A special from Madrid says that the government would be content to cede Cuba to America but would not pay an indemnity because unable to do so.

LONDON, May 5.—A special despatch from Madrid says that all the elements of a long civil war exist in Spain. The Conservatives and Carlists are the great parties of the future.

Some Conservatives gravitate towards Carlism.

MADRID, May 5.—2 p. m. It is believed

here that Commodore Dewey has lifted the Manila Cable but is not able to use it.

LONDON, May 5.—Another special from Madrid says the Republican and Carlis emissaries are endeavoring to incite mutinies in the garrison. Several agitators have been arrested.

MADRID May 5.—In a striking speech to Parliament to-day Romero, the leader of the Weylerites said that Cuban autonomy was a farce and called upon all Spaniards to defend the King and fatherland against Spain's internal enemies.

MADRID, May 5.—At noon yesterday the outbreaks in the provinces were assumed alarming proportion especially in the province of Gijon, Bay of Biscay, where the troops fired on the rioters in self defence.

The latest news from Gijon says that the artillery were ordered out at Talavera de la Reina, where Jesuit religious houses were burned.

It is asserted that the riots arise from hunger rather than political motives.

Owing to the outbreaks the province of Oviedo has been proclaimed in a state of siege.

LONDON, May 5.—The Madrid correspondent of The Daily Mail says The Cortes will to-morrow approve a measure prohibiting the exportation of corn, flour, rye, maize and potatoes, and suppressing the duty on importation of these articles.

LONDON May 5. The Madrid correspondent of The Morning Post says that the Spanish Government is aware that they cannot depend upon the army.

**DAIRY PRODUCE.**

Cheese Firm, White Advancing in Liverpool Butter Rather Easier.

The Montreal Gazette reports that an improvement in the market has taken place, both as regards value and demand, and quite a large quantity has changed hands at advanced rates. Montreal cable are dearer. Spot prices are: For finest Canadian and States makes, Septembers and Octobers, 40s to 42s; Augusts, 38s to 39s; Junes and Julys, 36 to 37s.

In Liverpool the cheese market has ruled strong and active with a brisk consumptive enquiry, and prices are again dearer. Fancy colored, owing to scarcity commands extreme prices. Market closes strong. Quotations are: Finest Septembers, colored 42s to 43s, with some extra fancy lots held for 44s, white, 40s to 41s; fine to finest, 39s to 41s; summer makes, 34s to 36s.

Butter is reported easier. Sales of creamery having been made as low as 17c.

There has been considerable speculative movement in oats in the past week; prices in this city are now steady at 40 cents per bushel, with a somewhat lower tendency.

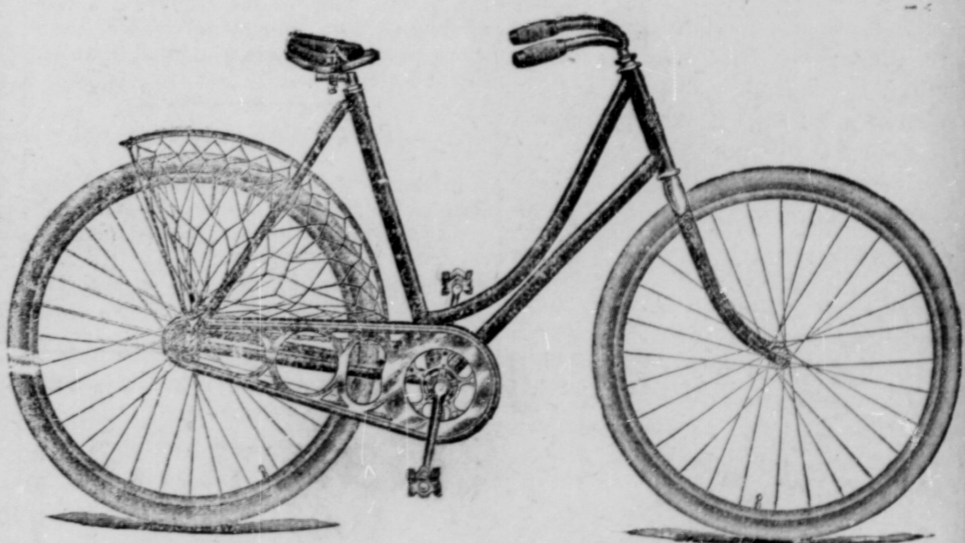
