Election of Water Commissioners.

THERE is so much scope for selection from among the candidates for the office of Water Commissioners, that many citizens will be puzzled in deciding for whom to vote.

Communication With the Mainland.

Our present representatives in the House of Commons have not completely destroyed our chance of obtaining continuous communication between this Province and the mainland it is not their fault.

The Governor-General and Mr. O'Brien.

MR. O'BRIEN secured for the Governor-General on his return to Ottawa a much warmer reception than he could have hoped for under ordinary circumstances.

In connection with the reception the following episode is related by the correspondent of the Toronto Globe:

"Immediately after the opening of the House to-day, Mr. Small, of East Toronto, moved that the House rise from 4.30 until 8 o'clock, in order to enable members to take part in the civic reception to Lord Lansdowne.

It appears, however, that Mr. Blake subsequently gave way to the force of the opinion of the House; for the same correspondent states that:

"Towards five o'clock again, when Mr. Watson was addressing the House in support of his anti-disaffranchisement resolution, the un-governably loyal Tories began shouting 'Six o'clock' and creating such disorder that Mr. Watson was obliged to stop.

That this incident, nothing could prove more clearly Mr. Blake's personal weakness as a Leader. Having taken a position with respect to the demonstration, he had not the moral courage to stand by it, or even to try to cope with the strength of the feeling in favor of Lord Lansdowne.

Archbishop Lynch spoke the simple truth when he said to a Toronto reporter:

"I am more than ever confirmed in my opinion that Mr. O'Brien, notwithstanding the righteousness of his cause, made a serious blunder in coming to Canada to attack the Governor-General. Both the Dominion Parliament and Local Legislatures passed strong resolutions favorable to home rule and the Irish cause, but Mr. O'Brien's unwise course will very largely neutralize the effect of these resolutions of sympathy, and awaken unkind feelings between Catholics and Protestants.

The mob which assailed Mr. O'Brien at Toronto helped his cause as much as possible; but as his mission was, essentially, an unwise one, the mob failed to create a counter feeling against Lord Lansdowne.

In a leader on Sir Edward Watkin's "Recollections," the Standard, now the leading London daily, says England must bear herself as becomes a great nation, worthy of such a daughter as Canada, and show that she is as capable of holding her own in the present as winning it in the past.

Dominion Parliament.

NOTES OF THE SESSION.

Hon. Mr. McInnes has introduced a bill (into the Senate) providing for the conveyance of Legislators and Judges free of charge over Canadian railways.

Hon. Mr. Mitchell has given notice that he will ask:

"Whether the Government, with a view of obtaining an arrangement of a Reciprocity or a Commercial Trade arrangement with the United States have received any propositions either written or verbal, from the Government of the United States or any member thereof, or any other person connected with the said country, and if so from whom have such propositions or propositions been received, and if so, what is the nature thereof; and have the Government of Canada, or anyone on their behalf, made any proposition or propositions to the said Government of the United States, or anyone on their behalf, and if so, what is the nature thereof?"

He has also given notice that he will move for an address to His Excellency the Governor General for copies of all papers and correspondence between the Government of Canada or any member thereof, or any member of either branch of the Congress of the United States, or any other person, with a view of securing a reciprocal Commercial Trade arrangement between the United States and the Dominion of Canada.

Supreme Court.

TUESDAY, May 31.

The Court met at twelve to-day. The Chief Justice and Peters and Hensley, J. J., presiding.

Hardy appellant, against Vessey, respondent. Appeal from a judgment of the County Court of Queen's County. The Court unanimously confirmed the judgment of the Judge of the County Court and dismissed the appeal with costs.

Mary McKenzie vs. Malcolm Stewart and wife. Action of slander tried last January. In this case the Court was of opinion that the statements set out in the affidavits filed by Mr. Fitzgerald were sufficient on which to grant a rule nisi for a new trial, which was made returnable next Monday. The Court stands adjourned until that day.

ACCORDING to the returns received by the Department of Agriculture, the total arrivals in the Dominion from January 11, 1887, to April 30th last, were 30,844, as compared with 22,723 in the corresponding period of last year.

BRAZIL is emancipating its slaves very slowly. When the process of gradual emancipation was begun, it was estimated that the year 1885 would see the last slave liberated, but there are now 1,330,000 men in Brazil who are still slaves. Only about 15,000 are liberated yearly.

The whole city of Halifax is to be lighted with electricity.

Sixty houses were burned near St. Petersburg May 24.

Sir William Dawson has been elected President of the Royal Society and Sandford Fleming Vice-President.

The Franciscans returning to Prussia under the ecclesiastical law are preparing to occupy the old Jesuit monastery at Creuseberg, near Bonn.

Lone Man, the Indian who shot Corporal Lousby at Fort Pitt during the rebellion, has been sentenced at Regina to five years in the penitentiary.

The boiler of the Natchez cotton factory at Natchez, Miss., exploded Saturday morning. Many of the employes were killed and injured.

In the Dooley murder trial which has been in progress at Woodstock, N. B., for some time, the jury have returned a verdict of "not guilty."

Mr. Henry Betts, a farmer of Shediac Cape, dropped dead on Friday last. He went out to the door and was seen to fall, and when picked up was dead.

The Empress of Austria will become patroness of a home for British governesses, which is to be founded in Vienna in honor of the jubilee of Queen Victoria.

Official statistics show that 49,254 persons left Alsace-Lorraine between the years 1880 and 1885, while during the same period there was a German influx of 36,958.

Petrified lobsters, clams, turtles, and the like are found in great abundance in the Santa Catalina mountains in Arizona, at a height of nearly 10,000 feet above the level of the sea.

It is reported that the Sultan of Turkey has dismissed a number of officials holding high positions in the Palace, who were discovered to be engaged in a conspiracy to overthrow him.

The anniversary of the battles of 1870 around Metz will be celebrated this year with musical eclat. Veterans will assemble at Metz from all parts of Germany to take part in the celebration.

Mrs. Elisha Brown, of Wallace Bay, N. S., died very suddenly on Sunday afternoon. She had eaten her dinner in usual health, after which she retired to her room, and died in the course of a few hours.

A little boy aged four years, son of Mr. Allan McDonald, James River, Antigonish, was drowned in the river near his father's residence, on Sunday, 22nd inst., while attempting to cross to the opposite side.

A talking canary has been discovered at Lowestoft, England. It belongs to a lady who has taught it to repeat several words and phrases, and to imitate successfully the notes of other caged birds.

Abdurrahman Khan, the Ameer of Afghanistan, is the latest royal recruit in the ranks of literature. His production is called "Sas-rishtaye Islamiah Rum." It is not a temperance tract as might be inferred from the title.

Mr. J. T. Hawke, lately editor of the Ottawa Free Press, has left to enter on his new duties as editor of the Moncton Transcript. Representatives of the leading club there have presented him with an address and \$200.

The Socialists have taken advantage of the strikes in Belgium to make demonstrations at various places. They have held several meetings, at which violent speeches were made, the red flag was displayed and the Marseillaise sung.

In the four years that the Brooklyn bridge has been open, 80,000,000 passengers have used the bridge, the traffic has grown from \$12,000 a month to \$75,000, and the number of passengers from 500,000 a month to nearly 3,000,000.

One evening last week while John Carmichael, blacksmith, and R. Martin were out gunning near Whococomagh, the gun carried by the former was accidentally discharged, the whole load striking his companion in the abdomen, wounding him seriously.

A clergyman who was officiating at the funeral of a young girl began his discourse with 'Oh! may this bereaved father find consolation for the death of his only daughter'—and then happening to remember that there was another daughter, the offspring of a second marriage, he added hastily—"by his first wife."

During the thunder storm of Monday night of last week a three year old son of Mr. Jos. Peters, of Rogerville, N. B., was killed by lightning. There were several persons in the room, sitting around, and the child was on the floor in the midst of them. The roof and floor were injured and the child killed. No one else in the house was injured.

At a time when American journalists are writing acres of literature on effete monarchies, it might be well for them to consider that during the reign of Queen Victoria there have been added to her territory 260,000 square miles; the population has been trebled; and the revenue has been increased from \$120,000,000 in 1835 to \$490,000,000 in 1885.

A customs officer, Friday afternoon, at San Francisco, seized the German barque Nautilus, which recently arrived there from Hamburg. The vessel was searched, and \$3,600 worth of Havana cigars and a quantity of French brandy found. The brandy was found in boxes labelled "salt pork." Search will be continued. A number of arrests will probably be made.
