SHOOTING.

To be a good shot is one of the most important requirements of the soldier of the present day. The nation that keeps up its practice is the nation that is going to win in the event of war. When we read that the cost of firing one of the big guns of today costs all the way from one to two thousand dollars we at once comprehend the difficulty encountered by a nation financially embarrassed in giving to her army and navy the necessary practice to make efficient marksmen. Of all the nations today there is none which realizes this more and makes such ample provision for it than our own beloved Britain.

In Canada we spend about \$1,500,000 in the Department of Militia and Defence. We have nearly 50,000 men bearing arms. This force is being continually drilled in company movements, manual exercise, etc., etc. These of course, are indispensable but if they should not be able to shoot accurately in coming into action these handsome battalions would simply melt away before the fire of an enemy trained to accurate shooting. Hence the necessity for constant careful training in the art of shooting.

We are, therefore, pleased to see the annual shooting matches come around and to see them well attended. Before a man ventures upon the butts to compete against his brother soldier he must have under one careful training in the use of his rifle. We therefore conclude that the man has spent both time and money (for he pays for his ammunition) in qualifying himself for the position he assumes. It consequently follows that the company which sends most marksmen to the annual matches, and carries off most prizes, will be a dangerous company to meet upon the tented field.

Next Wednesday and Thursday, the 10th and 11th, our rifle-men hold their annual matches upon the Kensington Rifle Range. The new arm, the Lee-Enfield, supplied to our Canadian militiamen will be used. This arm is very highly spoken of by the men, and, as excellent as has been the shooting in the past, we expect to see it surpassed at the coming meet. The ammunition used is what is called cordite, it is smokeless and we understand that the range of the Lee-Enfield is about three miles.

THE PLEBISCITE.

The prohibition plebiscite is to be taken on September 29. Touching this vote divergent views have been expressed in the Church Assemblies this summer. Gentlemen, who like Principal Grant, question the efficiency of prohibition, do not approve of it. Advocates of prohibition while accepting it, are not at one as to the end to which it points. Some regard it as a step towards the triumph of the principle. Others think it partakes more of the character of physical exercise. There are several points to be considered in connection with the same. One of no-doubt interest is the fact that we have had a plebiscite already. Four of the Liberal Local Government, approaching general elections, conceived the idea of getting rid of the temperance question by submitting it to a vote. Each of the Governments failed through. That is to say, it retained office. But after office had been assured, and the plebiscite had been taken, these Governments unanimously discovered that there was a grave constitutional question as to jurisdiction at stake, and that this would have to be settled before anything could be done. Meanwhile the Federal contest loomed up. In preparation for this struggle the very politicians who had already determined upon one plebiscite met at Ottawa, in party convention, and agreed that there should be another. The idea was quite in accordance with the views of Mr. Tarte and Sir Wilfrid Laurier, for, in addition to the temperance colouring which it gave to the Ottawa platform, there was a precedent for it, the plebiscite having figured in the French Revolution. Thus it happened that we reaped the second plebiscite.

A great deal of labor has been expended on attempts to elicit from the Government a declaration touching the course that will be pursued should the majority favor prohibition. It has, however, been labor in vain. There are dark hints as to revenue difficulties and constitutional difficulties. One member of the Government, the Minister of Justice, has indeed gone so far as to say that the jurisdiction rests after all with the provinces, from which it is to be inferred that the vote when taken will be laid aside, as having no bearing upon the question. The political history of the subject points to the conclusion that certain politicians, not desiring to bind themselves to any-

thing, yet wishing to figure on the prohibition side, have formulated this plebiscite idea to delude people who conscientiously believe that prohibition would be a good thing. Sir Wilfrid Laurier's theory would seem to be that after scoring a political advantage by promising a plebiscite he could wait for the vote, which if against the principle, would settle the question so far as he is concerned and if favourable to the principle would be nullified by the raising of a constitutional objection. But the application of the plebiscite to our system is a point which deserves consideration. We have in the Scott Act a straight referendum. The law is submitted; the people vote; and the popular wish rules. But the plebiscite enacts nothing. It is an academic affair, and however it goes it rests with Parliament to do the legislating. So that after all the campaigning and voting we get back to first principles. In other words, there cannot be a prohibitory law unless a Parliament favorable to such a law, and having the mandate of the people for its passage, has been elected. - Mail and Empire.

Many Miners Returning.

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 5. - Word came from the north yesterday of a desperate stampede from the Copper River country to the coast, the statement being made that 3,000 men are making their way over the Valdez glacier and that many of them are doomed to starvation unless the United States government send relief promptly. Advice received from Dawson state that the dissatisfaction with the administration of mining regulations is growing very widespread.

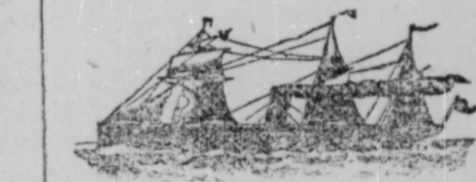

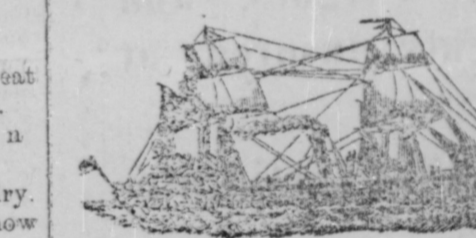
