

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

OTTAWA, Dec. 17.
Mr. Fleming, the Liberal M. P. for North Brant, already intimates that he will not again contest that constituency.

An election under the Scott Act will be held in the County of Inverness, on January 26th.

Economy, N. S., has been made a customs outport of Londonderry.

The Major General, in the militia general orders, warns the militia against any breach of discipline, and dispenses with the services of the officers of the Ontario battalion, for holding a meeting contrary to the orders of their commanding officer and passing complimentary resolutions.

There is a wild rumor circulating at Quebec that the North Shore Railway has been sold to Mr. James Gibb Ross and Thomas McGreevy, for eight million dollars.

Governor Cauchon has stated his intention of taking up his permanent residence in Manitoba.

St. John, Dec. 17.

The trial of Lewin, for stealing a \$1,500 bank check, and uttering it with a knowledge of the theft, resulted, this evening, in the disagreement of the jury, who stood eleven for acquittal and one for conviction. Bail of \$1,000 was offered, and will be accepted after Monday. He is held till then as witness in the trial of the bank clerk Furlong, which opens on Monday.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.

Proceedings in the Guiteau trial will probably be delayed several days, in consequence of the illness of the wife of one of the jurors. A plaster cast of Guiteau's head was made by Clark Mills, the sculptor, to-day.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, Dec. 17.

Sixty guineas premium were paid yesterday on the overdue steamer "City of London," from London, Nov. 13th, for New York.

The Council of the Rifle Association of Great Britain have forwarded to the President of the Rifle Association of America, a resolution adopted by them, expressing the pleasure they will experience in welcoming a team to Wimbledon. Earl Waldegrave, Sir Henry Halford, and Young and Humphrey, were appointed a committee to arrange for their reception.

DUBLIN, Dec. 17.

The Lord Mayor has declined to call a meeting of the Corporation on Tuesday next to consider a resolution to confer the freedom of the city upon Parnell and Dillon, as the question was recently decided by the Council.

LONDON, Dec. 18.

Blaine's despatches respecting the Clayton-Bulwer Treaty elicit strong protests from various quarters. The "Times," "News," "Observer," and other journals severely criticize them.

DUBLIN, Dec. 17.

The constabulary barracks at Croboy have been maliciously burned to the ground, the occupants barely escaping with their lives.

Armed bands are going about nightly throughout Counties Clare, Kerry, and Tipperary, firing into houses, and so intimidating the occupants. They fear to notify the police.

EUROPEAN.

BERLIN, Dec. 18.

It is reported that another mine assassination plot has been discovered at the Russian Imperial Palace at Galeshina, and that several officers have been arrested.

LONDON, Dec. 17.

A despatch from Zanzibar announces the capture of the owner of the slave dhow, in the encounter with which Capt. Browning, of the British man-of-war "London," was killed.

PARIS, Dec. 17.

Lieut. Cullier, an amnestied Communist, waylaid Sibour, nephew of the murdered Archbishop of Paris, and struck him. Cullier threatened to murder Sibour if he refused to fight with him.

VIENNA, Dec. 17.

The official report of the Board of Works on the Ring Theatre disaster says: The Chief engineer asked two policemen at the main entrance, whether there was anybody within, and received a reply that the whole audience had left safely. This statement was apparently confirmed by the fact that no persons were seen at the entrance to the building. Men of the fire brigade subsequently entered the galleries, but the air was suffocating and it was impossible to penetrate the passages, as the torches went out for want of oxygen, and the firemen were unable to breathe. The report expresses the conviction that the audience died speedily from suffocation. The correct list of victims by the theatre fire made by the police, places the number at 794. Only 144 have been identified.
