Island Life Underwriters Have One-Day Convention

Well known life insurance men from both Canada and United States discussed modern methods of life insurance marketing and service at the convention of the Life Underwriters Association of P.E.I., yesterday.

Special speakers included James C. McFarland, C.L.C., of Ohio; Charles M. Dunn, representing the Mutual Life of Canada, Regina, Sask., and Alex W. Lingard, assistant-general manager of the Life Underwriter's Association of Canada, Toronto.

Mr. McFarland spoke on the subject "The Philosophy and Techniques of Simple Programming" and "Simple Programming in Action". Mr. Dunn spoke on "Preparation for Selling" and "The Sale", while Mr. Lingard spoke on "What's Happening To Us".

Over 40 life insurance representatives were present at the one-day convention held at the Charlottetown Hotel.

The Life Underwriters Association represents more than 9,500 life underwriters in 76 communities across the country. It sponsors the two-year L.U.A. Training Course and the advanced three-year course leading to the designation "Chartered Life Underwriter", more commonly known as C.L.C.

General chairman of the convention was Roy McGillivray, Imperial Life, Charlottetown.

Ontario Dredging Contract Awarded Charlottetown Firm

A contract for approximately \$128,700 has been awarded to Maritime Dredging Limited, of Charlottetown, for dredging at Port Stanley, Ont., it was announced by the Minister of Public Works, Hon. Howard Green.

The company submitted the lowest bid on the project in response to the department's advertisement for public tenders. It is expected that work will be completed by Aug. 1, 1960.

Dredging will be carried out in four areas under this contract. An area 2,100 feet long by 150 feet wide will be dredging in the inner channel and harbour and an irregular area in the turning basin averaging 610 feet long by 200 feet wide. In the approach channel, the area to be dredged is outside the breakwaters approximately 1,000 feet long on centre line and 350 feet wide. The southerly limit of this area will coincide with the 21-foot contour, water depth reduced to zero.

Irving Tanker Held Firmly

The Irving Oil tanker "Seabook" is still aground on the mudflats in Charlottetown Harbor. So far the vessel or the mudbank has resisted efforts to refloat the tanker which is loaded with petroleum products.

Another tanker, the "Irvingwood" is slated to arrive in port and transfer the cargo as to lighten the grounded vessel, and make it easier to pull loose from the mud.

The "Seabook" ran aground Wednesday night in a heavy fog while trying to clear port. She is reported to be in no danger and to have suffered little damage in the grounding.

The work will involve removal of approximately 130,000 cubic yards (scow measurement) of sand, silt, clay and gravel, at the unit rate of 99 cents per cubic yard.

Plans and specifications were prepared by the London District Office of the Harbours and Rivers Engineering Branch, Department of Public Works.

3. "Maintenance of West Berlin's political and economic ties with the West."

Gromyko in the 2 1/2-hour running word battle, struck back at Herter's charge that the Soviet Union wants to pull West Berlin into the Soviet bloc.

Significant Step

Gromyko, in a possibly significant step, unexpectedly asked Herter, Lloyd and Maurice Couve de Murville of France to come up with concrete proposals on two points in their master plan for a German settlement.

Gromyko originally rejected this plan outright but now he said the Russians want to clarify:

1. The reference in the plan to a possible declaration against using force in the settlement of disputes, and
2. The reference to a "zone or area in Europe" of limited forces.

Herter interposed to ask if Gromyko would define the basis on which he intended to discuss these questions. He noted that the Soviet government has taken the position that there is no point in discussing the Western package plan.

Gromyko said Herter apparently was referring to Premier Khrushchev's refusal to negotiate

(Continued from page 1) initial capacity of at least 300 tons of bleached pulp a day. It would have a job potential of 1,200, including 300-400 mill employees, an annual payroll of \$10,000,000.

The minister said the proposed mill would have no adverse effects on the Bowater's Mersey Paper Company in Liverpool N.S., a newspaper manufacturer. The two companies would not be competitive.

"This is one of the greatest possible industrial developments we could possibly have," Mr. Manson said.

The agreement between Nova Scotia Pulp and the province gives cutting rights to the company on 10,000 acres in seven counties for 50 years.

The company proposes to use 150,000 cords of wood from its lands and 100,000 from private sources to meet the mill's estimated annual demand of 250,000 cords.

An estimated 24,000,000 gallons of water a day needed by the mainland under the Canso Strait. The bleached pulp will be processed into a high-grade paper for markets in North America.
