U. N. ADVANCE HEADQUARTERS, Korea, July 31—(Tuesday)—(AP)—The crucial conference on a buffer zone in Korea adjourned today at 12:35 p.m.—an hour and 35 minutes after Allied and Red delegates convened.

U. N. ADVANCE HEADQUARTERS, KOREA, July 31—(Tuesday)—(AP)—In a hard-bargaining atmosphere, the Communists were due to reply today to Allied insistence on a northern buffer zone in Korea.

At Monday's 14th meeting, the Reds got a fresh invitation from Vice-Admiral C. Turner Joy, chief Allied negotiator, to comment on the U. N. stand on a demilitarized zone "so that the final solution to this item may reflect our mutual views."

At Monday's continuous three-hour session, the Communist delegation confirmed it was their understanding that fighting would go on during the armistice talks. This was in response to a clarifying statement by Joy.

Higher Pensions For U.K. Servicemen

LONDON, July 30—(AP)—British offered retirement bonuses and higher pensions today to members of its armed services in a bid to win more men and women to lifetime careers.

Fawn Of Missing Doe Appears At West Cape

A beautiful fawn has been born to the doe deer imported into the Province, The Guardian has been informed by Mr. Arnold Wood, West Cape, President of the Prince Edward Island Co-operative Association Ltd.

No word has been received about the buck that was brought here last fall with the doe by the Provincial Government. The two deer were released on the New Glasgow farm of Mr. B. R. Bell, K. C., from where they escaped and began their tour of the Province.

Several deer carcasses were found along the shore of Prince County early in the spring and it is reported that the two deer were dead, one of them probably shot.

Heavy U. S. Air Raid On Pyongyang

U. S. EIGHTH ARMY HEADQUARTERS, KOREA, July 31—(Tuesday)—(AP)—A heavy United States air raid on the North Korean capital, seizure of a hill mass from the Communists on the northeast front, and a warning against a Communist ambush marked the sharpening Korean warfare Monday.

The North Koreans said today that their Pyongyang capitol building was shattered by the air raid.

Two Marine Corsairs were listed as lost after colliding in a cloud.

An F-51 Mustang exploded in the air when hit by small arms fire "just north of the battle lines."

The Pyongyang radio claimed 12 planes were shot down.

Besides the Pyongyang raid and front-line support operations, the Air Force sent B-29 Superfortresses against Chinnampo and Kyompo supply centres in Western Korea; and Hamhung on the east coast.

Allied troops Monday seized the crest of a hill mass northeast of Yangju on the east-central front.

They had fought for it for 5-12 days before the North Korean defenders fled. Adjoining hills in a defence chain were taken by the Allies Sunday.

Elsewhere, only limited patrol contacts were reported, but Gen. James A. Van Fleet warned his Eighth Army:

"We must not and will not permit this great United Nations army to become the victim of a Communist ambush."

Britain To Send Cabinet Mission For New Oil Talks

LONDON, July 30—(AP)—Britain decided today, on the advice of United States negotiator W. Averell Harriman, to send a Cabinet mission to Tehran for a new try at breaking the Iranian oil deadlock.

President Truman's trouble-shooter said he is optimistic. He started back to Tehran by plane to help as needed in the Anglo-Iranian talks.

Foreign Secretary Herbert Morrison announced the Cabinet decision in the Commons. He said he recalled the late Sir Harold Cripp, who made a flying trip to Tehran Saturday to clear up an Iranian offer to discuss the oil nationalization law on a new basis.

The months-long stalemate over ownership of the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company property in Iran has closed off a major source of oil supply for the West and Western Europe.

Britain said it will shut down the world's biggest refinery at Abadan Tuesday because storage tanks are full and the British tankship fleet is idle.

Some points of Iran's proposal still must be ironed out before Richard Stokes, Lord Privy Seal, leads the Cabinet mission to Iran, Morrison said.

Harriman hopes to see Iranian Premier Mohammed Mossadegh tomorrow.

Lightning Kills Three In Severe Alberta Storm

EDMONTON, July 30—(CP)—Lightning killed three persons in Alberta during the week-end as hail and thunder storms continued to swirl over the Province.

Mrs. Richard England, about 32, was killed Saturday night in her farm home 11 miles east of Barons in the Lethbridge area of Southwestern Alberta.

Two young children suffered foot burns when the lightning bolt which killed their mother tore through the roof of their home in Northern Alberta.

William Budner, 17, of Boyce Lake, 85 miles northeast of Edmonton, was struck Saturday night while working in his back yard.

Congress Told Danger of War Is Increasing

WASHINGTON, July 30—(AP)—Military chiefs have warned Congress the danger of all-out war is increasing, and the army alone plans to call up 430,000 men—possibly more—within the next 12 months.

Also, they plan to add billions more to the skyrocketing \$90,679,000,000 military budget already proposed to Congress for this year.

This was disclosed in testimony by Defence Secretary George C. Marshall, Army Secretary Frank Pace and others to a House of Representatives military appropriations sub-committee.

Youthful Gunmen Get 30-Year Terms

MONTREAL, July 30—(CP)—Two 20-year-old gunmen, Leopold LeBlanc and Raymond Moisan, were sentenced to 30 years each in the penitentiary today for staging nine armed robberies.

They pleaded guilty at their arraignment last Saturday to nine charges of conspiracy and nine charges of holding up in which they obtained \$1,524 from taxi drivers, restaurant owners and drug store clerks.

The bandits were arrested last Thursday.

Verigin's Son Is "Witnesses" Minister

VANCOUVER, July 30—(CP)—The son of Michael (Archangel) Verigin today disclosed that he is a Jehovah's Witness minister and thus cannot take over his father's title as spiritual leader of Doukhobors at Hillies, on Vancouver Island.

Russell Verigin, 28, said that the title "archangel" died Saturday with his father. The 68-year-old leader died in Vancouver Hospital.

Russell said Doukhobors at Hillies, 35 miles northwest of Nanaimo, would decide by voting whether a new leader should be chosen. He indicated they might decide to continue without a leader—much the same as they have for the last year during imprisonment and illness of Michael Verigin.

Heavy Voting In Israel Election

JERUSALEM, July 30—(AP)—Election officials reported heavy voting today in the hot contest for Israel's second Knesset (parliament). They estimated 85 per cent of the 900,000 eligible cast ballots.

The counting was scheduled to start when the polls closed at 11 p. m. (5 p. m. EDT).

An almost solemn attitude gripped the country for this semi-holiday. Shops, factories and offices closed and only vital services stayed in operation.

No major incidents were reported and secrecy of the ballot appeared to be generally respected.

Edward McEachern Of New Glasgow, N.S. Killed At Belle River

One man was killed and two others and a girl were sent to hospital as a result of a head-on collision of two cars near Wood Islands early last evening. Dead is Edward MacEachern, 22, New Glasgow, N. S.

In hospital at Charlottetown are Miss Jean Nicholson, Melrose, Mass., James MacEachern, New Glasgow, and Hugh Fennel, also from New Glasgow. The condition of all three is believed to be good despite painful injuries.

Miss Nicholson is not believed to be seriously hurt, but Mr. MacEachern is reported to have a fractured jaw and cuts about the face, while Mr. Fennel is suffering from a serious cut on the right hand as well as other cuts about the face and head.

The accident occurred about 6:30 last night as the car with Connecticut license plates, driven by Mr. Lloyd Murdoch, a cousin of Miss Nicholson who was accompanying him, met the Nova Scotia car, said to have been driven by James MacEachern, at an intersection at Belle River.

Occurred At Detour

The Connecticut car was on its way to Wood Islands while the Nova Scotia car was proceeding towards this city from the ferry. It had taken a detour and coming out at the intersection the drivers were said to have been unable to see each other until just before the accident. Each apparently miscalculated in an effort to avoid the collision but were unsuccessful.

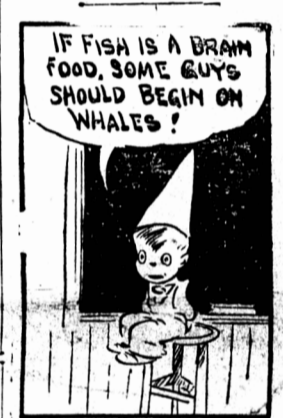
It is believed the Nova Scotia car drove into the left side of the United States car, skidded off and then rolled. It suffered serious damage and is believed wrecked while the other car has serious damage to the left side.

Emergency Treatment

Dr. H. L. Stewart, Eldon, was called to the scene and gave emergency treatment to the people involved. Ambulances of A. B. Gaudin and Harold Hennessey of this city went to the accident and took the injured to local hospitals.

Miss Nicholson is in the Prince Edward Island Hospital while the two men are in the Charlottetown Hospital.

All those involved have relatives in this province. Miss Nicholson had been spending a holiday with her grandfather, Mr. William Young Wood, Wood Islands, and Mr. MacEachern had visited his uncle, Mr. John Nicholson, Orwell Cove, and his aunt, Mrs. Richard Jenkins.
