The venerable clergyman was the recipient of many valuable presents from neighboring clergymen and from Hon. A. J. Macdonald and Joseph Macdonald, Georgetown; Notre Dame and St. Joseph's Convents, Charlottetown; the City Hospital and the Convent of Notre Dame, Souris. Two Sudden Deaths.

MONCTON, July 2. James Lear, a well-known traveler on the road for Gordon, McKay & Co., of Toronto, was found lying on the floor in his room at the Commercial Hotel, shortly after dinner time to-day. Doctors pronounced it a case of apoplexy. Lear died in about an hour and a half. He had been drinking hard but was about as usual in the forenoon.

OTTAWA, July 2.

John Page, Chief Engineer of the Dominion Canals, dropped dead in his office in the western block here at eleven o'clock this morning. Mr. Page was a Scotchman, aged 75 years. He served under the late Robert Stephenson as engineer of the northern lighthouse board. He came to America in 1838 and worked on the Erie Canal until 1842, when he entered the Canadian service on the Welland canal. He was appointed Engineer of Canals in 1863.

Big Fire in Boston.

BOSTON, July 3.

The territory bounded by Clinton and South Market Streets, Quincy Row and Atlantic Avenue was almost entirely burned over to night. A series of one story buildings located there were occupied by Armour & Co., G. F. & E. C. Swift, Geo. H. Hammond & Co., dealers in Chicago dressed beef, hams, etc., and 20 or more food and produce dealers who carried considerable stock, which together with large and costly refrigerators were destroyed. The individual losses cannot be given at present. The estimated loss is \$100,000 to \$120,000, upon which there is good insurance.

Democratic Convention.

AUGUSTA, Me., July 2.

Three hundred and eighty-five delegates were present at the Democratic convention to-day. The convention spent till 2 o'clock discussing the insertion into the platform of a resolution submitting to the people again the question of license or prohibition. The resolution was adopted after a long and stormy debate, by 145 to 99. William H. Bompfen, of Belfast, was nominated for governor by acclamation.

Fined for Prize Fighting.

ST. JOHN, July 2.

To-day the Police Court room was crowded with people to witness the trial of Jack Power and Dick Nagle, for leaving Canada to engage in a fight in another country. Both men pleaded guilty, and were fined \$100 each. This prevented the summoning as witnesses of all people who were present at the fight.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, July 2.

The Minister of Customs gave no encouragement to the delegation of straw hat importers who desired to escape making amended entries on goods imported between the first and final drafts of the new tariff. The Admiralty has published charts of the St. Lawrence River, below Quebec.

The legislature prorogued at 11.25 p. m. The Governor signed the Lobby Reform and West End Elevated Railway bills.

AGAIN DEFEATED.—The second race between Wm. J. O'Connor, the Canadian, and James Stansbury, of New South Wales which was rowed over owing to a claim by O'Connor that he was fouled by Stansbury in the first race on Monday week, took place last Monday on the Paramatta River, and was won by Stansbury, who thus secured the single scull professional championship of the world. The race was over a course three miles and 330 yards long, and was for a stake of \$5,000 besides the championship.

THE LOBSTER PACKING BUSINESS.—The Moncton Times says: "The lobster fisheries at North Shore were never in so prosperous a condition as at present. The catch has been unusually large, the size good and the market in England and Canada decidedly favorable. The shipments made to the London markets by the local packers have paid well. There are about nineteen factories between Buctouche and Cape Bald and they will probably average 400 per day. Mr. Kimball, at Cape Bald has about 4,000 traps in the water and will put up a large quantity. Mr. McLane has 600 traps and will pack considerable daily. On Wednesday Mr. Harpershipperd took two to England via Halifax. They sold for \$4,000."
