ness: Patricia Laidlaw of Calgary for her performance as "Doris Mead" in "The Gioconda Smile." Plaque presented by Saturday Night to the best supporting actor: Jean Coutu of Montreal for his performance as the sexton in "Les Gueux au Paradis."

In a 45-minute address, adjudicator Ruben summed up his views about the eight plays he has seen in this fourth Drama Festival since the war.

In presenting what he termed a "bird's eye view" of the week's performances, Mr. Ruben described the Little Theatre movement as a "good school" to bring on new actors.

"Therese," by Vancouver Repertory Players, was the first performance of the festival. In dealing with this type of drama, tragedy, "don't tell me by the sombre tone that its going to be tragedy," the adjudicator advised. "Build it slowly, and then you get the effect."

"Pionocchio," a mid-week performance by Ottawa Drama League's Junior Theatre was "excellent."

Comments on Local Play "Papa Is All" by Patterson Green and presented by Charlottetown Little Theatre Guild at the Saturday matinee was described by the adjudicator as a "contrived" sort of play.

Judging from the "fairly faithful" diction director Vera Millar had taken great pains to train the cast in that direction. Perhaps too much time was spent on this chore.

The play is about a Mennonite family dominated by a cruel and dull-witted father. The adjudicator praised the performance of Jean Giddings as the neighbor, "Mrs. Yoder." "In spite

and South Korean troops, hit back at the Chinese on an arc stretching from northwest to northeast of Seoul.

On the bloody central front, the U.S. 2nd Division hurled back waves of Chinese striking at its left, or western, flank south of Chunchon, between 45 and 50 miles northeast of Seoul. Previous Red assaults had hit the right flank in East-Central Korea.

One Hole Partially Sealed An Eighth Army briefing officer said the division had pretty well sealed a gaping hole on the right flank to the east between Hangye and Pungnam.

The situation is still dangerous," a briefing officer commented. "The Chinese have yet another penetration in the Allied line and are continuing to come through the hole."

Location of that gap was not specified. But the 2nd Division's stand appeared to have plugged the most menacing gap. Pressure on the right flank Sunday slackened under heavy Allied artillery fire.

AP correspondent William C. Barnard reported artillery and aerial fire in that sector reduced the Red force of 1,000 to 300 Sunday evening. The 300 survivors fled.

On the western front, South Korean troops smashed more than six miles northwest of Seoul against Communists in estimated battalions strength. Other Allied forces fanned out from the bristling Seoul defence perimeter to the north and northeast.

Red supply lines on the east coast were pounded by the U.S. battleship New Jersey, sister ship of the Missouri which left Korean waters after more than six months of action.

Strong Support From Air Allied planes gave maximum close support to ground forces. The U.S. Far East Air Forces announced more than 1,100 sorties were flown by fighters and bombers Sunday.

Even B-29 Superforts joined in assaults on Red front-line positions. The heaviest night front-line attack thus far in the Korean war, 40 B-29s and B-26s dropped 250 tons of 500-pound fragmentation bombs on the Reds.

The bombs were dropped with new radar techniques which compare in accuracy with daylight visual bombing, F. E. A. F. reported.

QUEBEC, May 17 — (CP) — Copies of Quebec social welfare laws have been presented to the Pope by Labor Minister Antonio Barrette, the Quebec Labor Department announced today. Mr. Barrette, who travelled to Rome to attend ceremonies marking the 60th anniversary of the encyclical Rerum Novarum, was received in private audience by the Pope yesterday.

"BEAUTIFUL DOLL" FILM GIVES BOW TO OLD-TIME FAVORITES —The good old days in Tin-Pan Alley when song-pluggers were wilder than movie press agents has been handled fondly by Producer George Jessel in his production of "Oh, You Beautiful Doll," the Twentieth Century-Fox technicolor musical currently playing at the Capitol Theatre.

While the picture tells the story of the fabulous career of Fred Fisher, who helped usher in jazz music at the turn of the century, other old-time song-writers were given a bow by the producer.

For sentimental reasons Jessel included a scene in "Oh, You Beautiful Doll" that showed pictures of Harry Von Tilzer, Ernest R. Ball, Paul Dresser, Jerome Kern, Con Conrad, Walter Donaldson, Gus Edwards, Jimmy Monaco, Joe Howard and Irving Berlin, all of whom were popular at the time Fisher was writing his tunes.
