

Stars Edge Dodgers 6-5 In City League Contest

Michael's Stars edged W. G. Barbour's Dodgers 6-5 yesterday evening at Memorial Field for their first win in the City Baseball League.

Lefthander Roger MacLeod set down the heavy hitting Dodgers on six hits in the seven inning game and allowed only two earned runs in posting his first league victory.

Earl MacKinnon started on the hill for the Dodgers and was relieved in the fifth by Phil Venoit. MacKinnon gave up all six runs but five of them were unearned. He allowed five hits and Venoit two.

The Dodgers scored three times in the second inning to race into a 3-1 lead as MacLeod lost his control. The youngster bore down for the rest of the way and allowed the Dodgers only single runs in the fifth and sixth innings.

The Stars scored three times in the third inning to take over a lead they never surrendered. They scored two more in the fourth.

Billy Purcell, back from the mainland hockey and baseball wars, led the Stars with two hits in two trips. Centre fielder Kenny MacDonald and second baseman Allan "Smelt" Gillis both got two hits in three trips.

Cuker Pineau led the Dodgers with two hits in three trips to the plate. Purcell and MacDonald cracked out doubles for the longest hits of the game.

Kenny MacDonald's long running catch off Ralph Pineau in the second inning was the outstanding defensive play of the game. Pineau blasted the ball high and deep into left centre field only to see MacDonald race over 50 yards and get the ball on his fingertips.

There were two double plays during the game. Allan Gillis, Don MacLeod and Rip Ready combined for the first while Cuker Pineau, Buck Whitlock and Eddy Lund completed the second.

Allan Gillis at second base for the Stars came up with a fine play on a hard hit ball by Gus Flynn in the sixth inning. Eddy Lund turned in a good game at first for the Dodgers.

Dobbs Signed By Hamilton

HAMILTON (CP)—Glenn Dobbs has been signed by Hamilton's Tiger-Cats of the Interprovincial Football Union and will report before the start of the training season July 12, it was announced Tuesday.

The "Dobber," one of the greatest triple threats in the game until injuries interfered with his play two seasons back and forced his release by Saskatchewan Roughriders last season, is reported well and fit again.

Now 34, Dobbs achieved fame with the University of Tulsa where he was named all-American in 1942. Taken up by Brooklyn Dodgers, Dobbs set records that still stand and later drifted to the Los Angeles Dons. After being idle for a full season, he joined Regina in 1951 and led the Roughriders to the Grey Cup final.

Dobbs ultimately became coach of the Saskatchewan Roughriders but gave way last season to Frank Filchock.

Dobbs will fight against Ed Songin, the Tiger-Cats 1953 quarterback, and Travis Tidwell, former New York Giant star, among others, for the regular quarterback slot.

Big Joe Black, the sensational reliever with the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1952 and a failure with the Dodgers a year ago, is on the comeback trail at Montreal. Black has been quite effective since he was sent down to the Royals and there are stories on the rounds that he will soon be heading back for Brooklyn. It was in Montreal two years ago that Joe made his first bid and it could be that history will repeat itself. Baz O'Meara in the Montreal Star quoting an American baseball writer had quite an interesting article on Black in his column the other day. Here it is:

"Joe Black is an intelligent young man, affable and reasonably loquacious with much more than the average ball player's flair for conversational clarity. Yet right up to the day that spring training began it was a cinch to stump him with a personal and seemingly simple question. All you had to do was ask the big Brooklyn Dodger pitcher what happened to him in 1953 and you would draw the sort of look you might expect if you had asked him how the hydrogen bomb works.

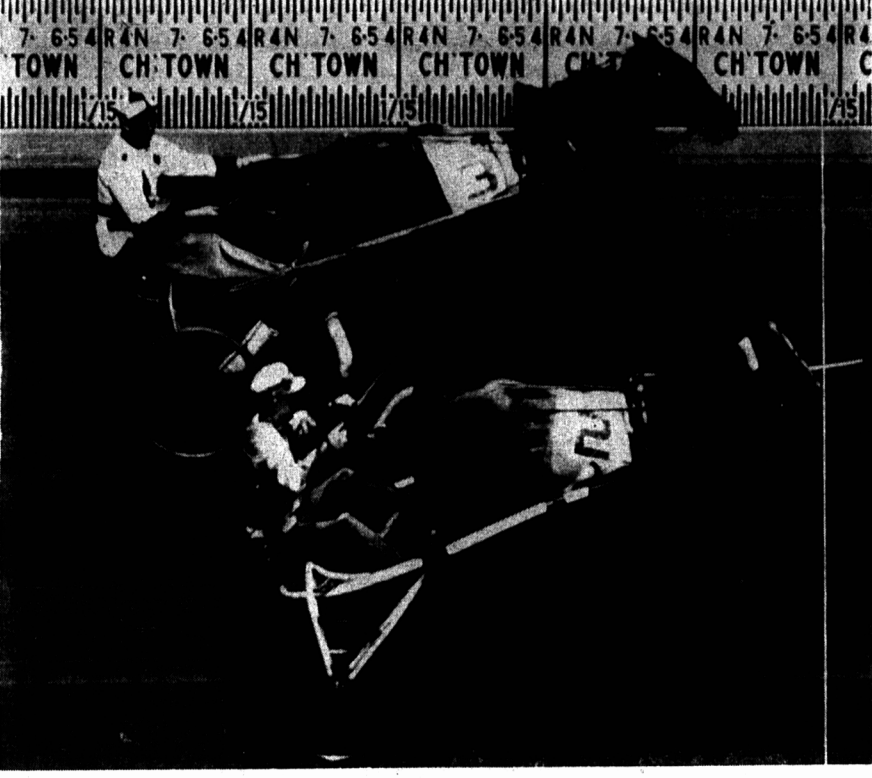
"Joe was bothered by the question, and didn't, despite the hasty stories to the contrary that were circulated last winter, know the answers. Evidence that he was puzzled by it all is in the industry with which he is now trying to work out the answers for himself in time for the baseball season ahead. During Joe's fabulous freshman year in 1952 when his high hand one and sharp control were setting the National League hitters on their ears. 'How come you are winning so easily?' someone always wanted to know after Black had saved another game for Brooklyn.

"There's no secret," Joe would say. "I just throw high when they tell me to throw high, and low when they tell me to throw low." But there was more than secrecy about his 1953 failure. There was mystery, too. And what made it even more perplexing was that at almost any sizable gathering of sports fans last winter, there were always at least a dozen people who knew exactly what had happened to Joe Black. Perhaps you haven't heard the popular version. It goes like this:

"Manager Charlie Dressen couldn't stand to let Black alone. He tried to teach him so much in the spring of 1953 that Black didn't have a chance to practice what he already knew until the spring was over. Then, according to the theory, it was too late. Hitters loved the new pitches Dressen had taught Black even more than Dressen had loved teaching them. Black could no longer control his old (and winning) pitches. Between the two, he lost his touch. Dressen gave up on him and Joe Black, rookie of the year in 1952, became Mr. Sophomore Jinx in 1953.

"It wasn't only fans and some trigger-happy reporters who spread that story around. One Dodger star,

who revealed everything but his name, claimed, "Dressen was a butcher. I never saw a man who could butcher pitchers like him. And what he did to Joe was worse than what a meat butcher would have done."

"Another Dodger pointed to results. 'Look at all the pitching trouble we had when Dressen was managing,' he declared. 'Charlie never pitched but he was sure he knew more about pitching than anybody else who ever lived. He had that way of pitching how brilliant he was. He didn't show Joe anything. He ruined him.'

"And from a Brooklyn pitcher: 'Never mind Black. I'm glad Dressen's gone myself. When he was here I never knew when I'd work. Maybe I didn't win all the time but I was trying. As soon as I'd lose Charlie would start talking behind my back. With Black he was worse. He tried to tell everyone he'd make Joe a pitcher. Joe made himself. All Dressen did was unmake him.'

"That's the attack. The defence came from a Brooklyn official. 'Black,' he maintained, 'is just a fair pitcher who was way over his head that first year. We all knew it. We just hoped he could keep getting by, and he did. He had a fast ball that wasn't the fastest and a nickel curve and control. We realized if his control slipped just a little, he wouldn't be worth a thing. That's why Charlie had to teach him a new pitch.'

"And suppose Dressen hadn't tried? 'Then,' the official said, 'the same thing would have happened. Black just didn't have his control last year. You can't blame Dressen for trying to teach him. That's what Charlie was paid for. Besides, Black spent a whole winter worrying about the sophomore jinx.'

A fair sized crowd of fans witnessed a good night's racing. Babe Britton's drives down the stretch in the Junior Free For All stole the show but there were plenty of other thrills during the meet.
