SIR.—Mr. William Welsh has promulgated in the Patriot of the 3rd inst. what he terms his *pro* of the statement made by him in the Examiner, that "the character of Mr. Frederick McMahon occupies no enviable position in the records of the Police Court." I am well aware, Sir, that, to a gentleman of Mr. Wm. Welsh's very refined feelings, a stand-up fight between two boys assumes the character of extraordinary turpitude, and blots forever the character of the fighter; but let us examine more closely this "mare's nest" which Mr. Welsh has taken so much pains to discover, and which he has afforded me the satisfaction of explaining to the public.

At 8 o'clock at night, in the month of November last—upwards of ten months back—according to Mr. Welsh's account, my son was insulted and struck by a young fellow who is at present in jail for stabbing another. My son struck back in return; and, like a plucky boy, gave him a thrashing. A crowd assembled, two brave policemen came up, took both boys to the Police Station, (there is no such place in this island or any other country as a *City Marshal's Court*), and sent at once for Councillor Heertz. When that gentleman arrived, he decided with little hesitation, and with the best and kindest intentions, I have no doubt, that the boys should be immediately discharged upon their paying five shillings each. My son laid down the money upon the table, was liberated on the spot, and thus this dreadful affair ended.

It will be now for the public to determine whether a case so disposed of, at such an hour of the night, in such a place, and by one Magistrate alone, can be considered in the formidable light of a *trial* before a Police Court, legally constituted in the face of day, and before the public, or as affecting the character of any high-spirited young fellow who has the pluck to resist an attack and punish an insult.

Mr. Recorder Lawson has lately defined a *Police Court* legally constituted, according to the charter of the City. There must be the Mayor and one Magistrate, or, in the Mayor's absence, two Magistrates, to enquire into and decide the cases brought before them. My son was never brought before such a Court, or any other Court in Charlottetown, nor does the certificate which Mr. Welsh has produced bear any internal evidence of it. If Mr. Heertz, therefore, acted for himself in so summary a manner, and directed my son to pay five shillings at that hour of the night, he can best explain whether he acted legally or not, how the money was disposed of, and why the two boys were not brought up before the Police Court on the following morning, where the matter could have been legally and properly investigated, instead of discharging them immediately from the Police Station.

It is but fair, Sir, that Mr. Welsh should have the full benefit of his laudable researches in pursuit of the repression of the crime of fighting among boys, which we must all admit is very naughty indeed. He has told me precisely what I wanted to know, and stripped his former communication about "records of the Police Court" of all its ambiguity, by unburdening his conscience of its overbearing secret.
