

# Pilots Stress Menace Of Fatigue At Conference

MONTREAL (CP)—The menace of pilot fatigue in airline operations was stressed Wednesday by airmen of 23 nations at final meetings of a six-day conference. The delegates—all pilots—passed a resolution urging that a pilot's maximum continuous time at the controls should be limited to eight hours. A spokesman said that at present pilots sometimes are on continuous duty up to 16 hours.

Capt. Clarence C. Sayen of Chicago, president of the International Federation of Air Line Pilots' Associations, also told a reporter the pilots want their authority more specifically defined in international law. The meeting of the annual conference of the federation was held in private at the International Aviation Organization headquarters here.

## NEEDED TO BE DEFINED

Capt. Sayen said various governments throughout the world now recognize aircraft skippers in much the same manner as sea captains. But the federation felt there is need for the duties and responsibilities of pilots also to be defined in international law as they often operated over a number of countries in a single flight. # Ontario Hydro Chairman Optimistic Over A-Power

TORONTO, (CP)—Dr. Richard L. Hearn, Ontario hydro chairman, said Wednesday hydro officials are confident nuclear power can be developed at costs competitive with other fuels. However, he said it is his personal opinion that nuclear power will in the future supplement Ontario's present hydro resources, but not displace them. Dr. Hearn spoke at the combined annual meetings of the Bureau of Municipal Research and the Citizens Research Institute of Canada.

He predicted the consumer demand for hydro in Ontario by 1975 will be 9,500,000 kilowatts. MORE POWER REQUIRED "Our system capacity at the time of St. Lawrence hydro completion will be in the order of 4,600,000 kilowatts—meaning that we will require about 5,000,000 additional kilowatts in the 15 years from 1960 to 1975.

"The major part of the 5,000,000 additional kilowatts can, of course, be met from the higher-cost hydro developments, from thermal generation, or from power imports." Dr. Hearn said the main problem facing Ontario in power production from thermal sources is the supply of fuel to produce the steam for turbo-generators. "Thermal power stations, as we
