Gala Holiday Features Levees And Accidents

Numerous parties throughout the province were held Sunday night as revelers bid farewell to an old "1961" and said hello to a brand new year.

Many residents attended parties and dances at clubs, dance halls, and high schools while others held their own private gatherings at home or at a friends house.

Yesterday New Year's levees were held by the Premier, the Mayor, the Lieutenant-Governor, the president of the RCAF Association, 201 Wing, the commanding officer of HMCS Queen Charlotte, the commander of 2 Militia Group and the executive of the United Services Officers Club.

A light snowfall during the afternoon made highways and streets extremely treacherous and both city police and RCMP were kept on the jump with numerous accidents, mostly all of a minor nature.

Both police forces reported a very quiet weekend with the exception of two minor breaks in the city. Both incidents occurred early last evening starting with a break at the Clarke Fruit Company where a thief or thieves entered by a rear window and made off with \$3.55 from the cash register.

The other break occurred at Roper's service station on Great George Street where the soft drink machine was broken into and an amount of money taken. It is believed that juveniles were involved in both breaks.

STREETS SLIPPERY
Slippery streets and conditions were responsible for a number of accidents in the city yesterday and over the weekend.
