Children Have Strange Names

The former Eileen O'Brien, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James O'Brien, was born at Elmstead and received her early education in the local school. Later she was graduated in Arts from St. Francis Xavier University, and then from the Royal Victoria Hospital School of Nursing in 1942.

Thus it came about that their fourth child was born in Nicosia, Cyprus, during their six months' residence there.

The family lived in England for a year before coming to Canada. Ten-year-old Shannon was born in Hamilton, Ont.; seven-year-old Eileen, who was born in Edmonton, and five and six twins, Shannon and Elizabeth, were born in Regina on St. Patrick's Day, 1960.
