PRINCE OF WALES COLLEGE.

The Patriot has once more ventured to touch the Prince of Wales College job. But the defence it puts up for the leaderless aggregation responsible for the iniquity is exceedingly weak.

Now what are the facts? Last year the government called for tenders for a college building according to plans made by Mr. Lemay, of Quebec. When the tenders were opened it was found that the lowest was for \$36,000 whilst the others were somewhat higher.

The Patriot says that "few alterations" were made in the plans. But the alterations made, according to reports, were of a very material character and would reduce the cost of erecting the building about \$12,000.

It will thus be seen that the plans were materially altered, and that as a matter of business and in the interest of the taxpayers, new tenders should have been called for.

Indeed the contrary is the case. Their whole course in connection with this matter has been in the highest degree reprehensible. They deliberately delayed the work of erection while they used the money that was raised for the college for other purposes.

But neither the government nor the Patriot minds a little matter like this, and at the next session of parliament it is intended that the amount already authorised for this purpose is to be increased to meet the exigencies of the case.

At the Limerick and Cork shows, held within the past week or so, the Canadian Government had very fine exhibits of produce of all kinds to which was also added a collection of metals, etc., which created much interest.

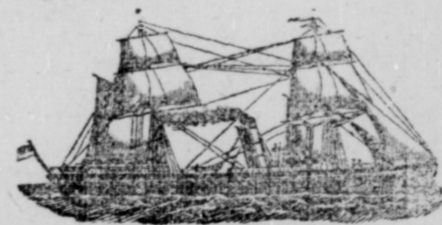

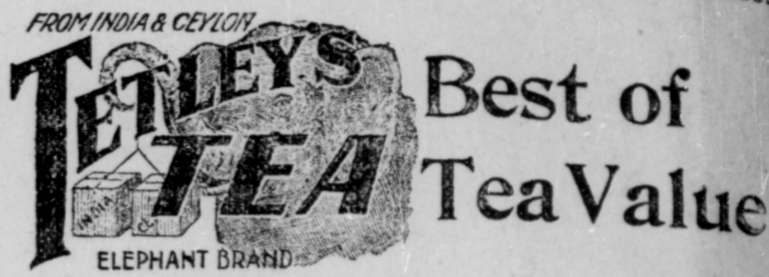
