DOMINION PARLIAMENT

OTTAWA, March 5.

In answer to a question, Hon. Mr. McLelan said the increase of the not public debt from March 1st, 1885, to March 1st, 1886, was \$15,832,422.

In answer to a question, Hon. Mr. Thompson said that the Government had no communication with the magistrate who tried Riel about the exercise of the clemency of the Crown, and that he presumed, when the magistrate said that he could hold out no hope that Her Majesty would exercise mercy on Riel, he made the statement as Judges occasionally do, as indicating his own view that clemency should not be exercised.

In answer to a question, Hon. Mr. McLelan stated that the gross public debt increase from March 1st, 1885, to March 1st, 1886, was \$24,983,632.

In answer to the question, what was the motive of the third respite granted to Riel, Hon. Mr. Thompson said: "It was granted to give time for the report of the medical commissioner, appointed to investigate Riel's sanity, to reach Ottawa."

Amoyt asked for copies of all commissions, instructions etc., furnished by the Government to Stipendiary Magistrate Richardson in connection with the trial of Riel. Hon. Thompson said in reply that as far as he knew no document existed.

A Terribly Sudden Death.

MONTREAL, March 5.

When the Dyde forgery case was resumed in the Court of Queen's Bench to-day, Colonel Dyde, father of the accused, being called to testify for the defence, dropped dead on entering the witness box. The greatest consternation reigned in court. The cause of death is supposed to be heart disease, engrafted by anxiety and worry at the exceedingly painful situation in which his son is placed, although the general feeling is that the latter is innocent of the charges laid against him. Col. Dyde was over 90 years.

Penal Servitude.

LONDON, March 5.

Eight men who had been convicted of taking a prominent part in the Trafalgar Square riots were sentenced to penal servitude for terms ranging from one to five years. The judge justified the sentence by denouncing the so-called popular demonstrations of working men.

Cholera again.

LONDON, March 5.

Cholera has been discovered at Venice on board a Greek brigantine, which has been ordered to quarantine. Chamberlain and Trevelyan deny that they contemplate seceding from Gladstone's party.

Ministerial Denials.

LONDON, March 5.

Gladstone has authorized a denial of the newspapers report that he had drafted a Home Rule scheme and shown it to his friends.

Reserves Summoned.

ATKINS, March 5.

At a Cabinet Council to-day it was decided to summon two classes of reserves comprising men of 28 and 29 years.
