

# NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

## CANADIAN.

HALIFAX, Oct. 21.

Smith, the murderer of Hney, at Lunenburg, has been sentenced to be hung on January 20th. He was recommended to mercy by the jury, which, endorsed by the judge, will probably procure a commutation of sentence.

## EUROPEAN.

DUBLIN, Oct. 21.

Officers are busy preparing information to be filed against the Land League agitators. The State trials in 1843, when O'Connell and the repeal leaders were indicted, will serve as a model for the prosecution.

CORK, Oct. 21.

The police have obtained a clue in the case of the murder of Hutchinson's driver. They have ascertained where the piece of iron used as a bullet was obtained.

BERLIN, Oct. 21.

Hamburg and Altona will be declared in a state of siege because of the agitation of the socialists.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 21.

The Tekke Tarcomans continue to make successful attacks on the Russian lines.

CASTEL NUOVO, Oct. 21.

It is stated that Admiral Seymour has notified the Admirals of the failure of the negotiations between the Turks and Montenegrins.

CAPE TOWN, Oct. 21.

Brigadier-Gen. Clark has relieved Mafatency. The Basutos vigorously resisted the relieving force. The British loss was 26 killed and 10 wounded; Basutos loss was 300 men.

## UNITED STATES.

LOUISVILLE, Oct. 22.

The Grand Lodge of Masons has been startled by the report of a committee appointed to examine the books of A. G. Hodges, grand Treasurer, showing that Hodges was a defaulter to the amount of \$7,000. The accused is sixty-four years of age, is one of the best known Masons and has held office for many years.

A twenty mile race between Miss Minnie Rinneo, of Greeley, Col., and Miss Emma Jewell, of Minnesota, was won by the latter. The distance between them at the finish was  $\frac{1}{2}$  of a mile.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 21.

Last night George A. Wheeler went to police station and confessed that he had murdered his sister-in-law, Della J. Tillson, and packed her body in a trunk. His statement was at once verified. The circumstances are remarkable. Deceased had been living with her sister and Wheeler, and the latter had subjected her to his desires, his wife being cognizant of the affair but concealing it to avoid scandal. Latterly one Pockham sought to marry Della. This created jealousy on the part of Wheeler who yesterday, while Della was sitting in his lap, choked her to death.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.

Despatches received from Fort Buford, Dakota, of the 15th state that Gen. Ferry authorized Col. Allison to receive the surrender of Sitting Bull and his Indians, the latter to give up all arms and ponies; the latter to be sold and cattle purchased for them with the proceeds; the Indians to go to any Sioux agency to which they may be assigned. If Sitting Bull does not surrender, the troops will move in force against him.

WARHAM, Mass., Oct. 21.

There was great excitement here this morning over a robbery and probably fatal assault upon Isaac Clements, a gentleman seventy years old and highly respected citizen of this village. Investigation showed that the robbery was committed last night, and Mr. Clements, who awoke while the robber was in his room, was terribly assaulted, receiving among other injuries a severe cut on the temple with an old lamp. He is not expected to recover. A young man of this village, who attempted to rob Mr. Clements a year ago, is suspected of the crime and his arrest is expected in a few hours. There is very great excitement in the village.

PITTSBURG, Oct. 21.

As the Pacific Express (west) was rounding a curve near Covevaugh this morning, the rear track of the tender jumped the track and forced the two express cars, one baggage car and a passenger coach from the track. Express messenger Charles McCloskey was crushed to death, and two passengers were slightly injured. The express car caught fire and was consumed.

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.

A strike is in progress at South side of Rolling Mills, 590 men having left work on account of the superintendents refusing to reemploy a union man who had thrown up his work some time since.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.

Adj. Gen. Drum telegraphed this evening to Maj. Fletcher, commanding military post near Los Pinos, to furnish whatever military escort may be deemed necessary to secure the protection of agent Berry in case he surrenders to United States Marshal, and ensure his safe delivery into custody of the civil authorities at Pitkin.

## SOUTH AMERICA.

PANAMA, Oct. 12, (Via New York, Oct. 21.)

In consequence of the indebtedness of the Columbian Government to British bondholders, the English Government, through its Consul here, has embargoed the subvention of the Panama R. R. to Columbia. This subvention amounts to a quarter of a million dollars per annum.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.

Lima dates to September 25th states that

the bombardment of Chirillo, Ancon and Chancay by the Chilians resulted in no damage and they left.

It is stated that Minister Christiancy proposed as the preliminaries of peace that Peru, Chile and Bolivia, each elect three commissioners to confer on peace propositions, to meet on Peruvian territory occupied by Chilians, and the United States ministers to Peru and Chile to take part as mediators.

The National Convention of Bolivia has decreed the denationalization of General Daza for cowardice.

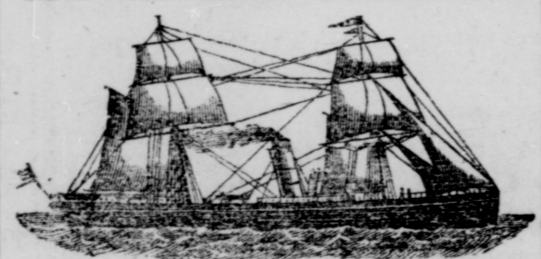
