Ferdinand Carrier Behind the Bars at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Oct. 20.—Ferdinand Carrier is behind the bars in a police cell. He was arrested on Sparks Street for firing off a revolver on Wellington Street a short time previously. "I want to shoot Laurier, let me alone," said Carrier as Constable Jollett arrested him.
