MONDAY

For the second successive year pupils of Summerside High School have all passed the entrance examinations.

Last year 22 out of 22 were successful, and this year 34 out of 34. In addition to this, Summerside High had seven pupils making an average of 75 per cent or better, while no other island school had more than one.

Out of nine subjects, pupils from Summerside High School made highest marks in four: Irene Mountain was high in Latin; Albert Boyie and Donald Gillis were tied for top spot in Rural Science.

On Saturday official confirmation was received by his wife and family in South West Lot 16, of the death of Colin MacKinnon in the tragic bus accident at Summerside, Ontario, on Friday.

A block of land has been secured from the Provincial Sanatorium Commission for the erection of a Composite Junior High School for Charlottetown, it was announced last night by Dr. R. G. Lea, chairman of the City School Board.

The transfer of land from the ownership of the Sanatorium Commission to the school board followed negotiations between two bodies and with the approval of the Provincial Government.

It was also announced that a meeting between members of the School Board building committee and the architect's (Messrs. E. H. Blanchard, Charlottetown, and William Downie, Halifax) final approval was given to the preliminary plans.

The seed potato crop on the island this year is very good, with every indication of an excellent yield, states Mr. Henry MacLaren, head of the Certified Seed Potato Inspection Branch, Experimental Farm.

There has been little or no early blight, but some late blight is showing up in some districts. In spite of the wet season we are experiencing, the blight is small compared to other years. This is explained by the fact that although the weather is wet there has been no excessive heat, and the bright breezes which follow the rain dry off the leaves before the fungi have a chance to become established in the plant.

This year shows an increase in seed potato acreage of 5200 acres. A staff of 28 inspectors is engaged in field inspection at the present time.

A highlight in the 150th anniversary services in connection with the arrival of the Selkirk settlers at Belfast was the address last evening by Mr. Malcolm A. Macquenn, Q.
