Memorial Services Held At Montague

In memory of our late sovereign, King George VI, an inter-denominational service was held in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Montague, last evening, and was conducted by Rev. F. N. Young, minister of the Presbyterian Church, assisted by Dr. A. D. MacKenzie, minister of Trinity United Church and Lic. W. D. Johnston of the Baptist Church. Mrs. Elsie Waterworth presided at the organ.

The memorial address was delivered by Dr. MacKenzie, who paid fitting tribute to our beloved Christian sovereign, using for his text Isaiah, 6th chapter. A solo "Crossing The Bar" was beautifully rendered by Mrs. W. R. Garrick. The hymns sung were "The King of Love, My Shepherd is," and "Abide With Me." The benediction was pronounced by Rev. Mr. Young. At St. Mary's Church a memorial Mass was celebrated by Mrs. W. R. Garrick, who also delivered the address, speaking in glowing terms a tribute to His late Majesty, King George VI, who had accepted his task, despite physical handicap, as a duty, and had completed his work in a manner well befitting so noble and beloved a man and king. He also prayed that Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, would be granted courage and strength to carry on the great traditional monarchy, and would be granted wisdom for the many difficulties which would be hers during her reign.

she had seen so wonderfully exemplified in the lives of her dear Father and Mother. I declare before you all, the young Princess said, 'that my whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong.'

Anxious Days

The years 1948 and 1949 saw our Sovereign forced, because of illness, to lay aside at least some of the onerous responsibilities of kingship, but it was not until September last that we realized the full suffering and serious nature of his illness. He was led to plead with God for his very life. Over the whole land and empire lay the gloom of a dread anxiety. Day by day the bulletins were deepening in the gravity both of what they said and of what they could not say. A nation, a commonwealth of nations, a world indeed, was listening with bated breath as each recurring message was flashed through the ether to the furthestmost limits of the earth. The thoughts of millions, in this and other lands, were concentrated on the shadowed sick-room in Buckingham Palace where His Majesty, worn with pain and exhaustion, was gallantly fighting his life.

A Shining Radiant

His earthly life is over. This work accomplished and the long day done. Freed from pain at last, encompassed by a universal love, his great spirit has passed —

Gathered to the quiet west. The downpour splendid and serene.

He has finished his course; he has kept the faith. Elsewhere, and beyond these voices, we believe, as he believed, there has opened before him a more perfect life and more abundant service.

As in a theatre, the eyes of men. After a well-graced actor leaves the stage. Are idly bent on him that enters next.

so it seems as if today a strange profound silence has descended on our common life, an awesome hush in which the voices and the striving of men are for the moment hushed as they stand at the salute to watch that noble and familiar figure go from us into the great Silence, panopied in the majesty of death.

For those who are growing old, his passing has left a shining radiance athwart their twilight skies, a tradition of honour and spiritual dignity, which they will reverently and affectionately cherish till their own last day is done. For these who now bear the heat and burden of the day, there yet abides from all he was and all he endeavoured to do an incentive to brave, unselfish living, and an impetus to raise their thoughts and desires to those things unseen and eternal among which his own heart and mind has ascended and continually dwelt.

As one who answers to his Master's call swiftly and quietly he went, without more pain and spared the sadness of the farewell. So he passed over and all the trumpets sounded for him on the other side.

Great and gracious Sovereign, take then thy rest! Noblest wert thou in the faithful service of thy God. Thy warfare accomplished. The powers of death have done their worst, but thy immortality remains secure. Amid the calm certainties of God, and in the glad company of those who by faith and obedience have won triumphantly to their shining peace, he hopes which sustained thee here, now know fruition, and thy simple faith is lost in sight! Ours is the loss, but thine the great reward. We who have loved thee in life will not forget thee in death. One day beyond these shadows, and on a happier shore, we shall greet thee in the brightness of the morning. Unto the blessed gladness of which meeting, may God in mercy bring us all!
