ICE CREAM is much more than a glamorous dessert. It is a nutritious food which should be kept in mind when planning family meals.

According to The National Dairy Council, "The best mix for ice cream is usually made with about 80 to 85 per cent cream, milk and milk solids; about 15 per cent sweetening; a bit of gelatin or other stabilizer and varying amounts of flavoring, often fruits or nuts. A serving of vanilla ice cream (2 1/2 cups) contains about 478 calories, 54 grams of fat, 54 grams of sugar and 15 grams of protein."

1/2 c. sifted flour  
1/4 cup salt  
1 1/2 cup. cream cheese  
2 cup. (soft)  
2 1/2 cup. butter (room - soft)  
1 tsp. crushed, fine-grated orange rind  
1 tsp. orange juice  
1 qt. vanilla ice cream  
1 c. orange marmalade, melted  
Sift flour and salt into mixing bowl. Mix cream cheese and butter smooth; stir in orange rind. Chill. Chop cream. Arrange chicken in layers in large low casserole. Combine and dust over flour, salt, pepper and paprika. Add celery and onion; dot with butter. Bake uncovered 20 min. in mod.
