Act was the nearest thing to prohibition they had, and it had been voted out by the city. Free rum followed. In his opinion the further from free rum they could get the nearer they would be to the Scott Act and prohibition. Free rum was the freest license they could have. The present bill was intended to restrict the traffic and kill out as many of the places as possible.

Mr. M. McKinnon said it was well known that the Scott Act was defeated in the belief that a license law would be obtained. There was a license law twenty-five years ago, and every one knew the state of affairs which existed then. Was it desirable to return to those days? He was surprised at the action of some members of the House regarding license, notably the Leader of the government. He believed the present law would not restrict the sale of liquor, while it would enable liquor sellers to make their saloons more attractive and thereby aid to their base influence.

Mr. A. J. Macdonald thought that if it was a revenue that was wanted the tax should be \$100 instead of \$200. Money would then be obtained. The \$200 tax on liquor would not be restrictive. The government was merely bidding for the liquor vote. There was nothing in the bill to recommend it.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson said it was difficult to tell just where the opposition are on this question. He thought it was time to let common sense have a chance, as had been remarked by Mr. Peters. The amendments to the Liquor Regulation Act submitted by the Temperance Alliance would yet come before the House. He was not hiding behind his ideas as to how they should do a thing. Let us see if we cannot make Charlottetown a better place to live in than it is at present. If forty or fifty people are selling, and the number is reduced about half, there must be a material reduction in selling and drinking. The bill will make it impossible for about one-half the present sellers to continue in the business. If the restriction stops the selling it will be a good thing. He would continue to fight rum, and would do all in his power to put down the liquor evil.

Mr. Shaw pointed out that the object of the imposition of fines under the Scott Act was to prevent the selling of liquor. The object of the present bill is to allow people to sell. He charged the Leader with not keeping his pledge regarding the introduction of a prohibitory measure and with swallowing his former utterances in opposition to license. He thought three might be enough honest temperance men on the Government side, aided by the opposition, to pass a prohibitory law and forever rid the city of the liquor curse. The time was opportune to take action in this regard.

Mr. Prowse thought the bill would do a great deal of good. It was not a license bill; it was merely a restrictive measure. He thought that the bill was a step in the right direction. It would close up more than half of the places that now exist, and this would mean a reduction in the drinking.

The section under consideration then carried. The remaining sections of the bill also passed. Mr. Shaw submitted the following amendment to the bill, which was seconded by Mr. Campbell:—

Whereas, inasmuch as an election for the revival of the Scott Act for Charlottetown can take place next year;

Therefore Resolved, That in the opinion of this House the passing of the bill before the House would be unwise and against temperance principles inasmuch as it would tend to defeat the revival of said Scott Act.

The House divided on the amendment as follows:

Ayes—Gordon, Shaw, A. J. Macdonald, J. A. Macdonald, M. McKinnon, Desroches, Campbell, Birch, Kickham,—9.

Nays—Farquharson, McMillan, McLean, Richards, McLaughlin, McNutt, Rogers, Sinclair, Prowse, Forbes, Peters, H. C. McDonald, Reid,—13.

The report of the committee regarding the second reading of the bill was then adopted. Third reading tomorrow. At the evening session Hon. Mr. Farquharson presented a bill respecting the fisheries and the rights of fishing in Prince Edward Island. Second reading tomorrow. On motion of Hon. Mr. McLan the House went into committee on the bill relating to the construction of the asylum annex and steel bridges, Mr. Reid taking the chair. The bill makes provision for an issue of debentures amounting to \$26,000.

The bill was discussed by the promoter, Mr. Gordon, Mr. Shaw, Mr. Campbell, Mr. M. McKinnon and others. The trouble with the contractor to whom the building of the wing was let some years ago was again reviewed, and the opposition strongly condemned the Government for their attitude towards Mr. Lowe. They also pointed out that the government had previously issued debentures for the asylum annex. But the money had not been used for this purpose and there was no guarantee that the money it was now proposed to raise would not be used for ordinary revenue.

The bill was read clause by clause and adopted on a party vote, after the following amendment, introduced by Mr. M. McKinnon and seconded by Mr. Shaw, had been ruled out of order:—

Whereas, For several years past the insufficiency of the accommodation afforded to patients in the Hospital for the Insane has been prominently brought before the House;

And Whereas, A sum sufficient to provide the necessary accommodation has been borrowed by the Government;

And Whereas, The failure of the contract with Mr. Walter Lowe has retarded the construction of that necessary work,—

Therefore Resolved, That in the opinion of this House the difficulties with the contractor should be adjusted and all the

damaged material on the ground should be disposed of in order that the Government may be enabled to proceed with the work. Mr. Peters presented a bill regarding the reclamation of marsh lands. Second reading tomorrow.

Hon. H. C. McDonald introduced a bill regarding the legalizing of certain holidays. Second reading tomorrow.

On motion of Hon. Mr. McDonald, the act respecting doves was read a third time and passed, also the act amending 61st Victoria Chap. 3.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Farquharson the House went into committee on the bill taxing certain incorporated companies and associations, the clauses relating to the taxing of steamship companies, being first considered. The clause passed after it had been amended by reducing the tax on steamships other than those owned by the Charlottetown Navigation Company to \$50, the Navigators Company, to pay \$100. The other clauses passed without amendment. The vote was a party one. Third reading tomorrow.

The House then resumed committee on the bill amending the Liquor Regulation Act. In committee the hour for closing saloons on market days was fixed at seven o'clock and the penalty for treating was fixed at from \$2 to \$5. It was also provided that a medical man who gives a certificate for liquor other than for medicinal purposes shall be liable to a fine of \$100. Several clauses were struck out including those relating to bar-maids and clubs.

The bill was reported agreed to, and set down for third reading tomorrow. House adjourned.

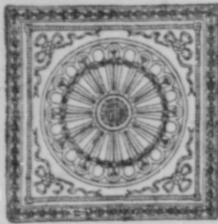

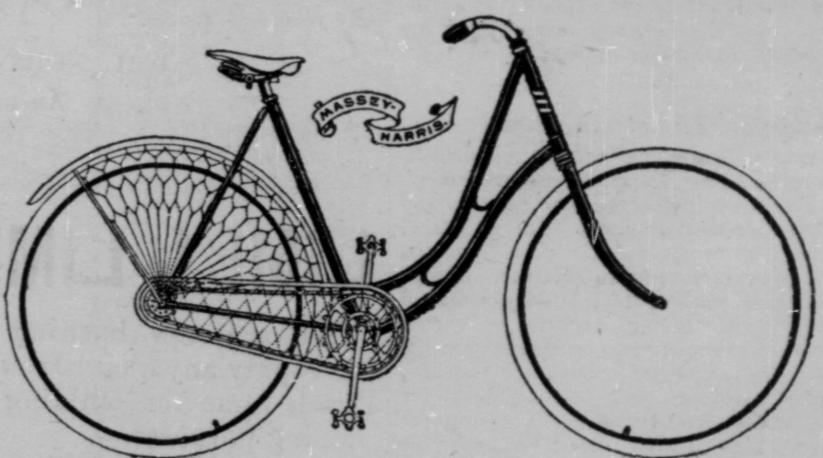
