## Queen Elizabeth Joins In Special Church Services

LONDON, (CP) — The Queen prayed at a simple, family church service Sunday—two days before her coronation—while throughout Britain, in high-vaulted cathedrals and humble village chapels, her people knelt to ask divine guidance for her. It was Trinity Sunday and the churches were filled. Elizabeth sat with the Duke of Edinburgh and the Duke of York on the grounds of Marlborough House, near Buckingham Palace. They participated in services conducted by Rev. Cyril Armitage, priest-in-ordinary to the Queen and vicar of St. Bride's.

Roman Catholics have begun three days of prayer which will end Monday night when mass is offered in every church in the country. Special Jewish rites will be celebrated in synagogues next Saturday.

In addition to the regular services, special sermons were broadcast by leading clergymen in programs carried by the BBC. They explained the meaning of the coronation, analyzing its many aspects. The ancient ceremony is largely religious in nature. The clergymen also explained the position of the sovereign in Britain's constitutional monarchy.

Meanwhile, the crush of visitors in London is still growing. Roads leading to the city are crowded with cars and buses. Traffic control officers said the influx had started as early as 3 a.m. Sunday and grown heavier by the hour thereafter.

Even at the necessarily slow rate of movement, there were occasional accidents. The usual number of fainting bystanders brought white ambulances into the tight-packed mass at regular intervals.

## Queen May Live In Canada For A Time

LONDON, (AP) — The Queen may live for a time in Canada and each of the six self-governing countries of the Commonwealth outside Britain under a plan under official consideration, it was learned Sunday.

Qualified informants said Prime Minister Churchill plans to broach the idea when he meets with

Commonwealth prime ministers after the coronation.

There was no official confirmation of the report. Churchill is expected, however, to make a statement on the subject in response to questions when the House of Commons resumes its sessions June 9.

A firm decision on the plan is still to be taken. It will, of course, depend on the attitude of the various Commonwealth governments.

Prime Minister St. Laurent will represent Canada at the Commonwealth conference beginning Wednesday.

In addition to Canada, the plan would call for Elizabeth, the Duke of Edinburgh and their children to live for a time in Australia, New Zealand, Pakistan, Ceylon, South Africa and India.

The informants say the idea seems to be that Elizabeth should begin to divide her presence and time more among the free peoples of the Commonwealth than her predecessors have done.

The belief among constitutional lawyers is that a royal progress through the Commonwealth in the next few years would give real meaning to the change in the Queen's royal style and titles.

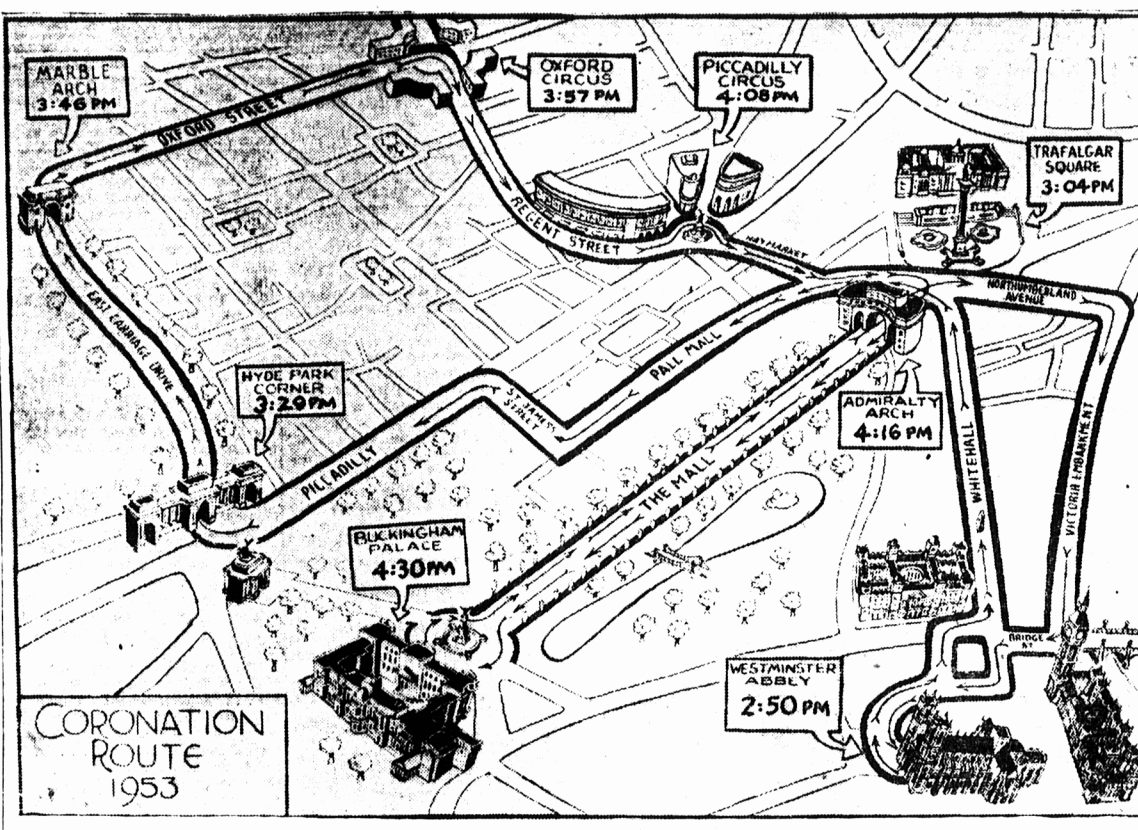

This route map shows times at which the Queen, riding in the state coach, will pass familiar London landmarks in the coronation procession after her coronation in Westminister Abbey which she leaves at 2:30 p.m. (BST), 9:50 a.m. (AST). Before reaching Buckingham Palace at 4:30 p.m., 11:30 a.m. (AST); the royal coach will pass: Trafalgar Square—3:04 p.m. (AST); Hyde Park Corner—3:29 p.m. (AST), 10:29 a.m. (AST); Marble Arch 3:46 p.m. (AST); Oxford Circus—3:57 p.m. (AST); Piccadilly Circus—4:08 p.m. (AST); Admiralty Arch 4:16 p.m. (AST); 11:16 a.m. (AST). On her way to the Abbey in the morning the Queen will start from Buckingham Palace at 10:26 a.m. 5:26 a.m. (AST), arriving at Westminister at 11:00 a.m. 6 a.m. (AST). Maggie cried with happiness. She left her native England 42 years ago and has never been to London.

The flames broke out shortly after Mr. Tower left for work.

LONDON, (Reuters) — Scotland Yard Sunday night announced a master plan to insure that no fanfare, pneumatic or headline-hunter mars the big day on Tuesday.

The main place they must protect is Westminister Abbey itself where a crank could conceivably hide overnight behind one of the throngs of statues or in one of the many recesses. Any unexpected incident in the Abbey June 2 could ruin the carefully-timed coronation ceremony.

Scotland Yard agents will search every foot of the Abbey. They will check each of the 7,000 guests

## Jockey And Former Cricket Player Are Included On Long Coronation-Birthday List

LONDON, (AP) — The Queen conferred knighthood on two of Britain's greatest and best-loved sports figures—jockey Gordon Richards and former cricket player Jack Hobbs—in a long list of coronation and birthday honors announced Monday.

Elizabeth, whose coronation the world awaits Tuesday, shattered all precedent in making knights of Richards and Hobbs. Never before has a jockey or a professional cricket player earned the knighthood.

Sir Gordon, who holds the world record for winners—about 4,650, is due to ride co-favored Pinza in the derby next Saturday. He has won everything but the Derby in his star-studded 32-year career. Also favored at 4 to 1 in the Derby this year is the Queen's own colt, Aureole.

Two Britons in Canada honored were James Thomson, deputy high commissioner in Canada since 1950, made a Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, and Daisy Fenwick, clerk of the United Kingdom trade commissioner's office in Winnipeg, made a member of the Order of the British Empire.

## Some Queen's Own Choice

Most of the awards were made on the advice of Prime Minister Churchill, but some were the Queen's own personal choices. The Queen's 27th birthday really was on April 21 but she celebrates it officially this year on June 11 in Britain. It was to mark that, and the coronation, that the long honors list was issued.

The Queen appointed the Duke of Edinburgh captain general of the Royal Marines—a post previously held by the late King George VI. The Duke already holds the posts of admiral of the fleet and field marshal.

The Duke was also appointed admiral of the Royal Canadian Sea Cadets, colonel-in-chief of the Royal Canadian Army Cadets and air commodore-in-chief of the Royal Canadian Air Cadets.

The Queen conferred many other honors on members of the Royal Family and accepted for herself the colonel-in-chief of several Commonwealth regiments and the post of honorary commissioner of the R.C.M.C.

The Queen named six new members of her privy council. The list also necessitates two by-elections to fill seats in the House of Commons vacated by two Conservative members now named to the peerage and thus to the House of Lords—Sir Peter Bennett and Sir Ralph Glynn.

His Excellency was assisted by Rev. Francis Corcoran and Rev. Francis Bolger, with Rev. P. F. MacDonald Master of Ceremonies.

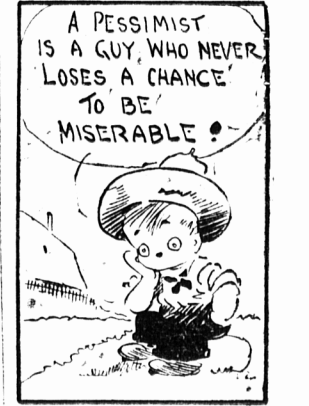

## Reds Granted Extension In Truce Talks Recess

MUNSAN, Korea, (CP) — The Allies granted the Communists a three-day extension of the recess in the Panmunjom truce talks Sunday—apparently to give the Reds more time to consider the latest United Nations formula for ending the Korean war.

The Communist negotiators will give their reply Thursday, after 10 days of studying the proposals, which have created a "rebellion" in South Korean government circles led by President Syngman Rhee.

The lengthy consideration being given by the Communists to the United Nations proposals has raised hope that they may be found acceptable and thus end the end of the war.

But while the Reds examine the UN plan, the South Koreans have been angrily attacking it. They describe it as a "surrender" to the Reds and have threatened to continue fighting if a truce is signed on the basis of such a plan. They have boycotted the truce sessions and say they will continue to do so.

Their chief objection is to the fact that 3,000 North Korean prisoners who balk at returning to the Communists would come under a five-nation neutral truce commission after an armistice. The South Koreans don't mind the 14,500 unwilling Chinese being handled by this commission but they believe the North Koreans should be given their full freedom immediately an armistice is reached.

## Operation In U. S.

LONDON, (AP) — Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden will fly to Boston in an R. C. A. F. Plane Friday to undergo another operation for a gall bladder ailment, his physicians announced Saturday.

The medical bulletin said the new operation will be performed at Boston's L-hay Clinic by Dr. Richard Cattell.
