(RNR/CUP) — There's more fuel for the controversy surrounding video games: researchers at Britain's Birmingham University says kids who play "Space Invaders" show exactly the same stress symptoms as a managing director facing a difficult board meeting.

And, they say, video game addicts face the same risks of long term heart and circulatory disease.

Psychologist Douglas Carrol says some players' heartbeats increase to the level of joggers', even though they're standing still. The games, he says, act like a pep pill, which may explain why some players report getting a "buzz" while destroying monsters from outer space.

Rotary Foundation Scholarships '85-86

There are five scholarships available from the Rotary Foundation of Rotary International which students may apply for. The purpose of these scholarships is to further international understanding and friendly relations among people of different countries. The scholarships are awarded for study in any field in another country. Applicants of these awards must not be Rotarians or dependents of Rotarians.

Bulletins about these scholarships have been sent to all the departments on campus to be posted on local bulletin boards for students' information. Also, I will be glad to give you any additional information that you would like concerning these scholarships. I have recently spoken to Gordon Avard, a local Rotarian, about the awards his club is sponsoring. The deadline is March 1st, 1984 and it would be a good idea to begin the application process as soon as possible if you're interested.

Parliamentary Internships (Canadian Political Science Association)

This internship involves working as an assistant to a member of the House of Commons in Ottawa. You will be assigned specific responsibilities and upon completion, must prepare a paper analyzing an aspect of parliamentary government in Canada. The internships are open to men and women who have recently graduated or will be graduating. They run for 10 months beginning in September 1984 and you are awarded approximately \$9,000 plus travel expenses. Application forms are available now. Deadline is January 6th, 1984.

Bernardine Hall Bursary Award

This bursary, which was first established last year, is once again available to Junior or Senior (female) students living in residence for two years. Students must have an average of 70% or above. A personal essay must be written on what you have participated in and done in residence over the year. It will be judged by Scholarship Committee and two people from Guidance Services. Application forms may be obtained in Student Services at the beginning of the second semester. The bursary will be awarded at the end of January.
