The Potato Bug.

SOME late numbers of the Summerside Journal contain well informed articles on the Potato Bug, descriptive of its origin, habits, and appearance.

"Where it once forms a colony it NEVER loses that foothold but sends out every year, in every direction, swarms of settlers."

"The third year after its appearance in any numbers, in any place whatever, it may be looked on as having taken final possession of the country, and the question of its increase depends upon the sort of war man wages against it, for he cannot exterminate it."

"If left to itself it would not leave a potato plant on the Island, and as it lives on other plants also, a potato famine, almost ruining us, would not exterminate the dreaded enemy."

"The ravages of the potato beetle have affected, and still affect, both quality and quantity of the potatoes every time man relaxes warfare against them."

"Now, I hope most truly, that our farmers will not delay in the fight by trying any other method but that which bitter experience has taught the Western victims of the plague who suffered the first, and every year since its start."

"The only sure means of fighting the insect, and these only perfectly successful when used without ceasing and with perseverance, are the gathering and destroying the perfect insect, the crushing of the eggs, but especially the use of arsenite of copper (Paris Green) for the larvæ (or bug) and the last remedy succeeds of itself, and is the only unfeeling one."

The Patriot of yesterday quotes with much satisfaction some silly observations from the Halifax Mail regarding the Act to prevent the spread of the Potato Bug in Prince Edward Island, passed unanimously in both houses during the late session.
