MONDAY
Mr. William Reginald Aitken, 71, well known businessman and sportsman of this city, died in hospital Saturday after an illness of more than two years.

The death occurred at the home of Mrs. Frank Vuozzo, Montague, yesterday morning of Mr. Ned McCarron in his 86th year, following a lengthy illness.

The late Mr. McCarron was born in St. Mary's Road where he pursued farming for many years.

Seven Ministers of Agriculture, accompanied by their Deputies, expect to settle down this morning to a review of the many and varied interests peculiar to agriculture, in which they are all deeply interested.

The visitors, who arrived in the city on Friday, had a routine session on Saturday for a short time, when an agenda was drawn up which is expected to run into several days to permit adequate coverage and discussion on all subjects submitted.

The Ministers will meet in the Legislative Assembly, and the Deputies will hold their sessions, for the time being at least, in the Department of Agriculture Board Room.

Top honors in the Queen's County elimination swimming meet held here Saturday afternoon were well divided as the contestants staged some keen aquatic battles before the large crowd of spectators on hand.

The meet which was held at Victoria Park off Brighton, was sponsored by Alpha Y's Men's Club. Contestants were Great and second place in Saturday's meet became eligible to compete in the Provincial Swimming Meet which will be held in Summerside later this month.

In addition to the diving and swimming events for boys and girls the Charlottetown Yacht Club held snipe and outboard races. The Red Cross Society, under the direction of Paul Cudmore also gave a life saving demonstration.

The death of Mr. John Turner, harness maker, occurred in the Veteran's Wing of the P. E. Island Hospital on Sunday afternoon where he had been a patient for the last five months. He was eighty years of age.

A tradesman of the old school, Mr. Turner served his apprenticeship with Mr. Jasper Pickard, with whom he remained, boy and man until 1914, when he enlisted in the 2nd Heavy Battery for overseas service in the Great War. Although at the time of enlistment he was forty three years of age, his splendid physique and previous training in the old 4th Regiment, led to his acceptance and retention on active service until the cessation of hostilities and the return of his unit to Canada in 1919.

With the official opening of Old Home Week and the Provincial Exhibition tonight cattle breeders throughout the Province are looking forward to the keenest competition for top honors in many years.

Upwards of 600 cattle of various breeds have been entered for one of the biggest shows Eastern Canada holds. This year the local Shorthorn breeders are expecting plenty of competition from the entry of Mr. Cyrus Eaton who operates the Deep Cove Farm in Nova Scotia. Mr. Eaton has entered several head from his well known herd.

The biggest entry list as usual came from the Jersey breeders who have listed 118 head. Other breeds are Guernseys 75, Holsteins 84, including several entries from the famous Bunsbury Farm herd of Premier J. Walter Jones, Ayrshires 113, Red Poll 40, Aberdeen Angus 1, Shorthorn 90 and Herefords 60.

TUESDAY

First results of the first day's lobster catch on the west shore of Prince Edward Island indicate that a good fall season can be expected. All fishermen completed running lines on Saturday with the highest boat yesterday landing 800 pounds at Leo Gallant's factory at Miminogash. Although too early to judge this is slightly better than last year's.

The 1952 Provincial Exhibition, with the biggest livestock show and the greatest horse racing program in its 94-year-old history, got underway last night with Hon. T. L. Kennedy, Minister of Agriculture of Ontario officially opening the show.

With the livestock barns full of the finest cattle, hogs, sheep, poultry and horses in eastern Canada and the racing barns packed with the fastest trotters in the Maritimes, everything is in readiness for the four day Fair which features a Youth Day program today.

Before officially opening the Fair Mr. Kennedy spoke of the great contribution which this Province has made to the livestock industry in Canada. He made special mention of the Yorkshire hog which he states "is one of the best quality hogs in all Canada."

Dr. J. P. Lantz, President of the Exhibition Association presided over the opening functions which were held during the night's racing meet. Several thousand people, one

of the largest opening nights crowds on record, were on hand for the opening and the races. His Honor Lieutenant-Governor T. W. L. Prowse, Premier J. Walter Jones, His Worship Mayor J. D. Stewart of Charlottetown and Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture spoke briefly offering congratulations to the Exhibition Association management and tendering messages of welcome to Fair visitors.

Th Hon. Laurent Barre, Minister of Agriculture for the Province of Quebec, was the guest speaker at the weekly meeting of the Rotary yesterday at the Charlottetown, when 30 guests augmented the usual attendance to 120.

Mr. Barre, who spoke in excellent English, expressed his pleasure and appreciation on being invited to speak before the club, in the presence of seven Ministers of Agriculture, and ten Deputy Ministers, representative of every province in Canada.

The internationally famous photographer, Yousof Karsh and Madame Karsh, are guests at the Charlottetown Hotel, having arrived yesterday afternoon. Mr. Karsh who brought portraits to a high state of perfection through the avoidance of the commonplace, has had the distinction of being called upon to take pictures of the members of the Royal Family in England, and the rulers of European countries.

A marked improvement in quality was noticeable again this year in the Women's Institute Handicraft Exhibition which opened last night at the Exhibition grounds in conjunction with the Provincial Exhibition.

Articles are shown to better advantage this year since the Women's Institute building has been enlarged and greatly improved, and the extra space was also appreciated by the judges who were at work all day yesterday. There are about the same number of exhibits as last year—although the number of exhibits is less in some classes, there is a corresponding increase in others.

A light training plane with two aboard was reported missing on a training flight from the R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, late yesterday afternoon.

The plane, a Harvard, took off at 1 p.m. A search was organized following its failure to return by 4 p.m. It is a yellow coloured craft bearing the initials "VC 65". The plane was engaged in low flying exercises including aerobatics.

Late yesterday a search was organized under Sqdn-Ldr. J. M. Wicken. Eleven planes are participating. They covered all the western half of the Province, including coastal waters before dark. Planes were also up last night looking for flares. The nature of its flight is one that probably would not take it more than 35 miles from base. Names of the men aboard were not released pending notification of next of kin.

WEDNESDAY

Quality was the keynote of the Hereford Cattle Show held at the Provincial Exhibition yesterday at the Sanderson Brothers and Bob Borden of North River, along with L. J. Buell and Son of Murray River, gave followers of beef cattle a first-rate show.

Failing to obtain Federal permission to build a new boat for the Wood Islands-Caribou service Northumberland Ferries Ltd. will make a determined effort to find a Canadian-built, diesel-powered vessel which can be purchased and converted to the purpose. Announcement to this effect was made yesterday by Mr. R. E. Mutch, president of the company, following the company's annual meeting.

As a fitting climax to a career devoted to the upbuilding of Canadian agriculture, Dr. J. A. Clark, former Superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Farm in Charlottetown, was accorded the signal honour yesterday of planting a Norway maple tree on the lawn he planned more than 40 years ago.

The conference of Agriculture, Ministers and Deputies held in Charlottetown for the past few days concluded last evening with a garden party at the Experiment Farm. The sessions and discussions occupied about three days, and during the course of the conference problems on soil conservation, dairying, animal foods, and freight assistance; the poultry industry including Newcastle disease control; feeding stuffs and diseases; a consultation for the future conduct of similar conferences, as well as a number of other important matters concerning agriculture, were under discussion.

A highly successful Youth Day was staged at the Exhibition Grounds yesterday in connection with the Old Home Week celebrations. It was estimated that over 3,000 school children from all parts of the Provinces were present and Mr. H. J. Kennedy, manager of the Exhibition, stated last night that the idea will be continued in future years and the program will be expanded.

Nancy Irene Lowther, fifteen months old child of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Lowther, died yesterday forenoon as a result of an accident which occurred at the home of her parents at New Dominion.

While her father and Alex McE Isaac of Fairview were working on the latter car, the child who was playing in the yard was believed to have returned to the house. However as the car was moved, the little tot was apparently playing in front of the vehicle and was crushed. Death followed almost immediately.

The dairy part of the Provincial Exhibition cattle show got underway here yesterday morning with the red and white Ayrshires and the pale golden Jerseys in the spotlight as they paraded to and around the show ring in one of the finest dairy cattle exhibitions witnessed here for some time.

Col. F. I. Andrew's Glengarry Bit of Fashion again won the grand and senior male championships in the Ayrshire classes. Veteran cattlemen were loud in their praise of Glengarry's showing as it is not too often that a 13-year old sire appears at an Exhibition let alone win grand championship.

The largest swine show for the past several years and possibly the largest in the history of the Provincial Exhibition was held yesterday with the well filled classes featuring some of the keenest competition seen here for some time.

Championship honors in the male classes were won by Col. F. I. Andrew of Charlottetown and Almon Boswall of Marshfield. Col. Andrew won the grand and senior championship with his boar Woodstock Duke 126C while Mr. Boswall won the junior championship with Woodstock Duke 80E. Mr. Boswall also bred the grand champion.

In the female competitions Andrew Bain of French River won the grand and senior championship with a sow bred by Roland Paynter, John R. Thompson, Charlottetown. R.R. 3 won the junior championship.

THURSDAY

Mr. Don Logan, engineer from the office of the Civic Aviation Branch, Department of Transport, Moncton, accompanied by instrument men Edward Grant and Neil Smith, began work yesterday morning on surveying a suitable site for a new runway at the Charlottetown airport, in the event of such an addition being decided on.

The preliminary hearing of John Murphy, who appears before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, in Queen's County Magistrate's Court on July 30, on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of Robert Clark Bryenton on July 5th, in an automobile accident, was continued yesterday morning.

The hearing, which had been postponed from July 30 to August 13, was further postponed until August 20, after certain evidence was heard.

Judging of the Horse Show at the Provincial Exhibition has been underway for the past two days and will probably be completed today as judge J. M. MacCallum of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa places the horses.

Top honors in the various classes have been well distributed in the show, which judge MacCallum considers would hold its own with any in the Dominion.

The veteran stallion Civic Chief Jr., who has been a consistent winner at the Exhibition for the past number of years, again won the grand and senior championships in the classes for Registered Clydesdales. The stallion is owned by Cecil J. Stewart of New Wilshire.

Veteran cattle breeders vied with one another for top honors in the Shorthorn Show at the Provincial Exhibition yesterday and the placings of their well filled classes with their top quality cattle were keenly followed by a large crowd of spectators around the show ring.

Approximately 90 head of Shorthorns were exhibited yesterday, one of the largest and best Shorthorn shows to be staged here in a number of years. Competition was tough and judge Glen Reichel of Jarvis, Ontario, had a heavy day's work as he placed the cattle according to their merits. Reichel, himself, quite a breeder of beef cattle in Ontario, was well pleased with the quality of Canadian stock at the show and commented very favorably about Teckaydee 4d, a Shorthorn female owned by Athol Roberts of Southport.

The judge liked this animal well enough to place her at the top of the female classes as he awarded her the grand and senior championships.

But, to give an example of the toughness of the competition, R. R. Bell's Rollin Augusta gave the Roberts cow quite a battle for senior honors. Rollin Augusta was the aged female class and the senior reserve ribbons as well.

FRIDAY

The induction of Rev. A. Frank MacLean, B.A. (above) as Minister of Trinity United Church, Charlottetown, in succession to Rev. H. E. D. Ashford, D.D., is expected to take place early in September. Final arrangements will be made by the Presbytery of P. E. Island, of which Rev. D. Wallace MacPherson, Murray Harbour, is chairman.

Several thousand racing fans remained at the track yesterday afternoon at the conclusion of the racing to watch the parade of livestock led by the winners in each class.

The infield was littered with prize horses and cattle. The former ranged from the winning show horses among the trotters and pacers to every breed of cattle on display at the Exhibition. Taking part as a special feature was the famous Abegweit Milady, world's champion from the Bunsbury Farm herd of Premier J. Walter Jones. She was not in the competition this week, but the Premier brought her in to show the public what she is like.

The biggest and possibly the best Guernsey Cattle Show held at the Provincial Exhibition in recent years was staged here yesterday and it featured some of the keenest competition seen in a local show ring as newcomers and veter-

erans alike took their share of the ribbons. Approximately 100 head of Guernseys paraded before Judge Murray Leonard of Clarence, Nova Scotia, in what Leonard considered a "grand cattle show." Leonard judged the Guernseys here last year but he considered yesterday's showing superior to that of a year ago.

An outstanding feature of the exhibition was the showing of Harold Palmer, Kensington. Palmer made his first appearance in a show ring yesterday and the Kensington farmer took one championship, a reserve and quite a number of other high placings.

The Red Polls and Angus beef cattle were judged yesterday at the Provincial Exhibition by judge Glen Reichel of Jarvis, Ontario with J. Gordon Rodd of North Milton taking all the prizes in the Angus and The Upton Crest Farm winning the top honors in the Red Polls.

Planes from Summerside R. C. A. F. Station yesterday flying in clear, sunny weather completed a full search of both probable and possible areas and failed to find a clue to the disappearance of a small, yellow, single engine Harvard training plane and the two men which have been missing from the Summerside station since it disappeared on Monday afternoon while on a local flying exercise.

A total of 8,704 square miles was searched yesterday making a total of 23,704 square miles searched, but have been searched three or four times since the plane was reported missing.

All of the "probability" and "possibility" areas have not been completely covered. However, officials said that the search will be continued on a reduced scale for an indefinite period.
