SUMMER RESIDENCE AT TRACADIE

A brief description of Mr. Alexander Macdonald's Summer Quarters. The new summer residence built at Grand Tracadie by Rhodes, Curry & Co., of Amherst, for Alexander Macdonald, Esq., of Charlottetown, was on Saturday last, handed over to George D. Longworth Esq., Mr. Macdonald's representative in this province. The occasion was fittingly celebrated on the premises, and Mr. Lewis was present with his camera, and took several large photographs of the building and grounds. Mr. Macdonald's new house, which is situated on the finest summer residence in the Dominion, is situated on the farm lately owned by John D. McAnulty. It fronts northeast on a delightful surf-shore, and there is a large pond of fresh water within one hundred yards of the south side of the house. The house itself is forty-eight feet wide by eighty-five feet long, and it is two and a half stories high. A veranda twelve feet wide and one hundred and twenty feet long extends around three sides of the house. Upon entering the house by the main door the visitor finds himself in a hall twenty feet by fifty. On one side of this hall is a fireplace of native stone 8 feet wide in width. A massive stair-case leads off the hall to the second story which is fitted with a gallery all round looking down on the main hall. This gallery is hung from the ceiling by iron rods, thus doing away with the necessity for pillars in the lower hall. The dining room is twenty-two feet by thirty, and in it there is another open fireplace as well as a large built-in buffet leading to the kitchen. There are also a large reception room, a smoking room and a bedroom on the first floor. On the second floor there are seven large bedrooms, and on the third floor there is a large billiard room besides several bedrooms for servants. There are two bathrooms on the first floor and one on the second. They are elegantly fitted with all the latest and most approved appliances. A large bowing alley has been erected in the rear of the house. A windmill with a tank containing twenty-five barrels at the top supplies the house with water for all purposes. On the lawn in front of the house a tall flagstaff rears its head, from which the Stars and Stripes proudly floated on the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. The grounds are being beautifully laid off with flower beds, etc. The house reflects the greatest credit upon the builders, Messrs. Rhodes, Curry & Co., as well as upon Mr. C. E. Campbell, who superintended the work of erection under the direction of Mr. Longworth. It is all finished inside with the best quality of spruce and red cedar, no plaster being used. The foundation of the house was laid on the 6th April, and in less than three months the entire structure was completed and handed over. Mr. Macdonald and family are at present in Italy. They hope, however, to be able to reach this province early next month, and to spend a few weeks at "Dalvey," their new and handsome summer residence at Tracadie. "Be still, faint heart, and cease repining, Behind each cloud is the sun still shining." Yes, and it will be shining to-morrow, we confidently expect, on Zion Church picnic at Suffolk.
