

ON THE WAY TO ROME.—The London Weekly Register of the 16th inst., has the following:—

“We learn, on good authority, that Dr. Forbes, the Scotch Episcopal Bishop of Brechin, has gone on a mission to the Holy Father, and that the right reverend gentleman is to be the spokesman, or representative on the occasion, of several other prelates of the Anglican Church! What is the nature of the message with which Dr. Forbes is charged, or with what object, or intention, he seeks an interview with his Holiness, we are unable to say.”

A HINT TO SMOKERS.—M. Melsens, a French chemist, has found that tobaccos from various countries contain nicotine in very different proportions. In tobacco from some parts of France there is 7.99 per cent. of nicotine; while Havana tobacco contains only 2 per cent. He proposes to smokers a way of preserving them from the effects of the alkaloid, by putting into the tube of the pipe or cigar holder a little ball of cotton, impregnated with citric and tannic acids. As the smoke passes through cotton, it will deposit the nicotine therein, in the shape of the tannate and citrate.

The New York Tribune closes a glowing account of the condition of the crops in the United States as follows:—“On the whole, the promise of abundant harvests never was brighter. It is true that adverse conditions may arise, but sufficient for the day is the evil thereof. Duty and hope belong to the present. At the lowest estimate, the present golden sunshine is worth a million dollars an hour.”

SUPREME COURT—JUNE TERM.

The June term of the Supreme Court was opened at the Court House, St. Eleanor's, on Tuesday, the 9th instant, Judge Peters presiding.

The following gentlemen composed the Grand Jury:—James Campbell, Esq., Foreman; Charles Green, R. Gordon, Wm. Haywood, E. L. Lydiard, H. Compton, D. McLellan, A. McGowan, A. Montgomery, John Miller, R. Gaudet, R. Wright, W. Tuplin, John Green, Andrew Campbell, R. McC. Stavert and G. Crosby, Esquires.

Nearly all the members of the bar were present, and each seemed to have a bag full of briefs. Litigation is evidently prosperous in Prince County, and the sooner we have a new and more commodious Court House the better. The old thing which now stands in the village of St. Eleanor's, and is sufficed to answer the purposes of both Jail and Court House, is, indeed, a shabby affair and utterly insufficient for the present requirements of the County.

The Grand Jury found bills of indictments for larceny, forgery, assault, &c., against several parties; but on their being called for arraignment, it was ascertained that the accused, as well as their bail, in all cases but two, had left the Island for parts unknown. The crown prosecutors were, therefore, relieved from some little trouble.

On the civil side, the docket of causes was unusually lengthy—and the number of appeals from inferior tribunals was nearly forty, many of them being sent up in a manner that indicated either gross ignorance or culpable negligence on the part of the officials in the courts below; and Judge Peters intimated that if an action or two were brought against some of the erring “justices,” or their clerks, it would have a wholesome effect on them and tend to bring them to a realization of their responsibility.

Unquestionably the blunders of many of the Small Debt Courts are becoming too frequent, and call for severe reprobation. In fact, one or two gentlemen of the bar, the other day, obtained from the Court rules nisi against some of the Commissioners Courts for irregularity in filing appeal papers, &c. Any one who refers to Laird's or Harvie's Almanac, will see that the “Magistracy” of the Island is quite imposing and formidable in point of numbers; but many of the names might be appropriately transferred to the retired list.

The Jury cases tried this term were not of special importance, save, perhaps, that for verbal slander, which we give in our list of cases. This case created a great deal of interest and attracted a numerous assemblage to the Court. There were probably forty witnesses subpoenaed, and most of them examined, and the trial lasted two days. Many circumstances of a nature too indelicate to mention, were disclosed by the evidence, and we, therefore, refrain from publishing any of the details. As far as the verdict is capable of vindicating the plaintiff's character, that vindication has been established to the extent of £200 damages, and probably £100 costs.
