

# Cannon Leads Curranites To 4-2 Win Over Royals

Maurie Cannon's clutch hitting led the Curran & Briggs team to victory over the RCAF at the airport diamond last night by the score of 4-2. Cannon batted in three of the runs, with a single in the fourth sending Buckley and Lefurgey across the plate, and a long fly to right field sending Lefurgey home in the sixth. The Curranites fourth came in the seventh when Coke Grady blasted a triple down the right field line to score Grant Grady from second.

The airforce boys got their brace of runs in the fifth when Mackenzie got a soft double on a pop fly, Coke Grady and two outfielders doing the "after you, my dear Alphonse" act, and letting the ball drop in the centre of them. Stan Richard then hit a home run scoring Mackenzie ahead of him.

Ed Buckley allowed no hits for four innings and only twelve men faced him in that time. In the last five frames the Royals cracked out nine hits off his slants, another of these being of the cheap variety when Grady and the outfielders did an encore on the first performance off Killy's pop in the eighth. Buckley struck out 12 batters and did not issue a single pass to first base. Gaudet was touched for only five hits, but walked seven. He whiffed four.

Grant Grady made a pretty running catch off Baker's foul fly in the sixth, after the big Royal first baseman threatened to foul the rest of the evening away. Gaudet's lunge and stop of Pete Green's hard smash to the box in the fourth was another nice fielding play. Grant Grady of Cur-

ran & Briggs, and Richard and Mackenzie of the Royals led with the bludgeon getting two hits apiece.

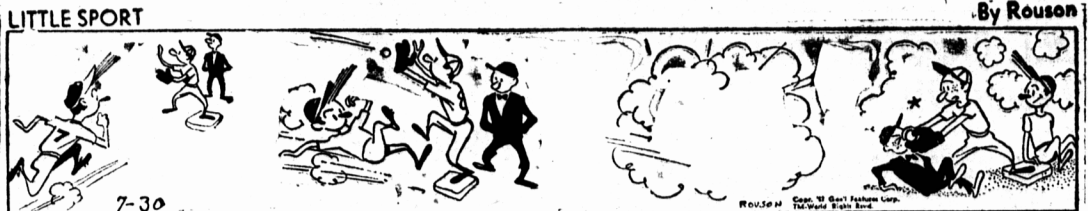

# Ted Williams Rejoins Red Sox

BOSTON, (AP) — Looking as physically fit as when he batted 403 back in 1941, Ted Williams rejoined the Boston Red Sox Wednesday by signing a contract that extends through the 1954 season.

It's a military secret, said general manager Joe Cronin who asked if owner Tom Yawkey had resumed his salary dealings with Williams in six figures.

Before Ted left the Sox for his Korean war hitch with the marines his salary was estimated as high as \$125,000 annually.

Guesses were that the splendid splinter might get as much as \$50,000 for the remainder of 1953 and perhaps \$60,000 for all of 1954.

Obviously happy to be back in baseball after his second wartime service as a marine flier, Williams told an overflow gathering of baseball writers that he feels "just as young as I did when I came here 12 or 13 years ago."

New York Yankees and Chicago White Sox gained another full length over the other would-be contenders in the American League pennant race Wednesday.

The Yankees spotted Cleveland Indians three runs, then caught up and beat them 7-3. Chicago ruined Ted Williams' Boston homecoming with an eight-run ninth inning rally for an 8-3 triumph.

Blanked for eight innings and held to two hits by Maury McDermott, the White Sox set off a furious barrage in the final frame. Bob Elliott started the fireworks with a single, and then came a double by Sam Mele, an error and a single by Jim Rivera.

Ellis Kinder replaced McDermott and got Chico Carrasquel on strikes. Billy Pierce sacrificed and a double by Nellie Fox, a walk and a pair of back to back home runs by Minnie Minoso and Fred Marsh completed the rout.

The victory was the 12th this year for Pierce and the runs Chicago scored in the ninth were the first the White Sox had gotten for their

stylish lefthander in 17 innings. Cleveland scored all of its runs in the second inning at New York with four singles, a walk and an error by Gil McDougald on a potential double play ball.

The Yanks went to work on Bob Lemon for single tallies in the second, third and fifth innings and then climaxed the afternoon with four in the sixth.

Billy Martin followed a walk to Gene Woodling with his 10th home run, and three singles plus an error brought in two more. Viv Rychak went all the way for his eighth victory.
