No harm is reported from the recent thunder and lightning storm in any section of the Island except a slight disarrangement on the Eldon and Flat River telephone branch. An inspector was out Wednesday and the lines are all right this morning.

The steamer Fastnet arrived at this port Wednesday forenoon about 11:30 o'clock, with a full cargo and the Misses Benoit as passengers. She sailed for St. John's in the afternoon with several passengers from this city. She returns here this morning to Ch'town, thence to Halifax in the afternoon.

COMPLAINTS are constantly being made of the crowd of "tramps" who frequent Crabbe's Corner, especially on Sunday evenings, and annoy passers by their profane language and discourteous remarks. We call the attention of our police authorities to this, and will be glad to hear of the arrest and punishment of the parties should the practice be continued.

CAPTAIN KELLY of the SS. Premier reports that on Monday night while the storm was at its height they were off Camps, and rarely has he experienced a more severe storm. The wind blew fiercely, and hail stones struck so hard that the glass in the windows had to be covered to save it. The second mate measured one of these pieces of ice and found it 1 1/2 inch.

In the police court yesterday George Rood and John Collins were fined for drunks \$3 or 14 days and \$1 or 4 days respectively. A young man arrested for larceny was discharged, the prosecutor not appearing. A nuisance case was disposed of by a fine of 5 cents and costs, another adjourned. The case of John Mills, charged with indecent assault, was adjourned till Monday.

MR. W. STARK of Liverpool, Eng., paid a flying visit to our city on Tuesday night. Mr. Stark is the representative of one of the largest egg importing companies in England, and while here in conversation with Mr. J. A. Farquharson, one of the largest egg exporters, stated that he considered the prospects for Island eggs were good in the British markets, but insisted on the necessity of careful packing for shipping.

The general office of the Masonic Temple of Chicago has formed a bureau of assistance and entertainment for visitors to the world's fair at Chicago. The bureau has been incorporated under the laws of the state of Illinois, and is formed on the subscription plan. The bureau offers six general forms of contracts, the payments for which can be made either in weekly or monthly installments, ranging from \$7.50 to \$4. The object of the bureau is to provide for and entertain its guests in any manner desired, at any scale of prices, and for any length of time. The bureau will be connected by telegraph and telephone service with all the leading institutions of the city.

The Government has let the contract of the railway coal to the Glace Bay Coal Company, who have built two new coal backed barges and are launching a third this week from the shipyard at Mahone Bay, Lunenburg Co., N. S., for the prosecution of the trade. They have also purchased a powerful Boston tug boat, the G. M. Winsor, at a cost of \$9000. The company will have facilities to supply 1000 tons of coal here per week, as they will keep one schooner at the wharf, one at the wharf and one en route at the same time. The Alice is now unloading at the railway wharf, where she has been tugged by the C. M. Winch, Captain Nutter in command. She is the best adapted boat for the purpose we have seen, and carries a freight of 600 tons. The coal landed here will, we understand, cost \$2.38 per ton.

A PUBLIC meeting of the P. E. I. Stock Breeders Association was held on the 10th inst., at which addresses were delivered by such practical farmers as, Albert Boswell, Wm. Mitchell, George Tweedy, Donald McKay, M. P. A. Macdonald, Chas. Dockendorff, James Guard, Richard Bagnall Wm Crane and others. The recent importation of valuable cattle by the Board of Commissioners for the Government Stock Farm was alluded to, and the Secretary, Mr. A. McNeil, was instructed to ask for a copy of certificate of registration and other particulars relating to those animals in the record book kept by the Secretary are entered horses and cattle for sale. The record shows that there are some fine animals in the market. The Secretary has received forms of application for the entry of pedigrees in the principal associations of the Dominion, from Henry Wade, Esq., Secretary Agriculture and Arts Association, Toronto, and Professor George Lawson, Secretary for Agriculture, Halifax, N. S. Also from J. H. Stearns, Esq., Secretary, forms of application for registration in the American Trotting Register Association of Chicago. These and other important records are available at the office of this association.
