The Survival Training School teaches techniques of survival to aircrew and other personnel who, in emergency, may be in unhabited and isolated areas. Its classroom is the "great outdoors," at Jarvis Lake, Alta., where summer and winter bush survival training is given, and at Resolute Bay on Cornwallis Island, N.W.T., where arctic survival is taught.
