



# DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Right at the top of our column we are featuring a letter from our good friend Cecil H. McGinley, Houlton, Maine. He has packed a lot of news into a couple of sheets of paper. "This has been a good winter for training in this section of the country. Mild weather and little snow to contend with. The Houlton track has been kept scraped and the footing has been especially good for sharp-shod horses. Miles around 3:00 have been reported for horses that are to race at the early meets. The Rob Ryan stable numbering ten head left last Tuesday by truck for Harrington, Delaware, and included in the string was your namesake, Colonel Dan 2:06 3/5, that earned \$5,465 in 1952, making his total earnings \$25,785.33; Jolity Girl 2:07 3/5 had earnings in 1952 of \$5,517.50. Other pacers Bob is taking with him are Lock Hanover 2:07 3/5, King Ester, a green pacer of great speed that paced a mile for Bob last fall in 2:06 3/5, but whose manners have brought grey hairs into the heads of previous trainers. Then there is Suzanne, a four-year-old pacer with no record that started a few times at Yonkers and Roosevelt. Skiller, a slow class trotter, and four lasty Frisco 2:07 3/5 colts two and three years old. He plans to race at the early Yonkers meeting. Previous to his departure 24 head were getting their daily lessons at the track and a dozen more were being trained at the Birmingham track nearby.

"The Nemi Green horses numbering five head, of Presque Isle, and the horses of Simonson Brothers of Bridgewater, who is here last winter are being trained by Townsend Ackerman at Skowhegan. It is reported that Arnold C., a two-year-old pacer by The Widower 1:59 1/2, that cost Simonson Brothers \$3,600 at the Harrisburg sale last fall, is very promising. Roy Gantley from Houlton, who is racing a stable at Toronto, reports mild weather there and he plans to race at Richelleu Park spring meeting at Montreal before returning to his home training base at Gorham, Maine. The conflict between the horse training base at Scarborough, Me., and the Gorham track does not appear to be any nearer a peaceful settlement. Gorham has always offered good purses and has been a good track to race over and it is unfortunate that the litigation cannot be settled as the opportunity to race there is sorely missed by Maine horsemen. Weekly race meets are held on the ice at Mars Hill, and Fort Fairfield and races are held on the Ocean Beach each Sunday at Scarborough. I am enclosing clippings.

"Bennie Ryan of Newcastle, N.B., was up this way looking for a race horse to replace one he lost in a fire a few weeks ago, and purchased the pretty and well-bred mare Countess Carla 2:14, by Carlos Day 2:04 1/2, from Ralph Haley of Fort Fairfield. Do you recall me telling you of the beautiful young trotter I saw at Foxboro that could be bought for \$1,000. His sire was Darnley 1:59 1/2 and his name was Dumbarton, and the week after I saw where he had won a \$1,500 stake and the price was up to \$2,500. He was sold for that money. I note that he earned

around \$2,450 last year and took a record of 2:11 4/5.

"Bill Stiles and Mrs. Stiles, George Carpenter and Mrs. Carpenter and Bob Brown of Woodstock, N.B. are vacationing at Orlando, Florida, and Bob writes that Earle Avery has some very fast colts in his stable, also that Brooks and Drew of Augusta, Maine, have a couple of speedy two-year-old pacers in the Del Miller stable that are being trained by Jimmie Jordan. When Bob left home he planned to return by way of Kentucky and visit some of the stock farms there. This is a most enjoyable trip for any horse person. I made it several years ago and have never ceased talking about it.

"E. C. Ted and Mrs. Grant have returned from a trip to Florida and report cool weather while they were at Orlando, but warm at Miami. E. C. Wellington and Mrs. Wellington, owners of Mr. McGee 2:10, are also in Florida and plan to stay a few weeks. I see that Vern Irving of Shediac is also down there with a couple of colts that are showing well. I hope that new Florida track at Delaer, gets off to a good start and has enough horses to provide good racing. If it does well we will all want to ship there next winter."

And now for the clippings... Pine Point, Me., Jan. 31: Chuck Worthy, sharp pacer unbeaten in two starts on the Pine Point track, will match gait with the trotter Nibble Win in the 8th race, a feature of the nine-dash light harness card for Sunday. Chuck Worthy will be driven by owner Bill Bowen of Old Orchard. Buddy Reed from Gorham, will guide Nibble Win. The Waterville, Me., Fair, a very successful event, a number of years ago, may be revived this season. Two interested persons spoke in favor of it to the racing commission and reliable sources say that ample funds up to \$100,000 would be available for the Fair.

Maine race fans may also have a new style of wagering—Quinnella—at their disposal this season. It is a similar form of betting to the daily double and it applies to the seventh race only. The Maine Fair Harness Racing Commission has announced dates for the 1953 season. Bangor Fair will start the season with races scheduled from July 27 to August 1; Presque Isle Northern Maine Fair racing follows, August 3 to 8, with New Gloucester Fair next, August 1 to 15, followed by Skowhegan Fair, August 17 to 22. Other fair dates are: Union, August 24 to 31; Windsor, September 1 to 7; Lewiston, September 7 to 12, Norway-South Paris, September 14 to 20; Farmington, September 21 to 26; Cumberland, September 28 to October 3; Fryeburg, October 5 to 10; Topsham, October 12 to 17. Horsemen who are planning to race in Maine after the season should cut these dates out.

The mention of Chuck Worthy 2:04 1/2 racing over the ice in Maine brings back to mind his great performance at Charlie Willis' Covehead Race Track, September 19, 1946. He was then a nine-year-old pacer and had been trained to perfection by Johnny Campbell. The purse of \$1,000 had been put up to attract the best performers in the Maritimes and when the battle was over Chuck Worthy was 1-1-1, True Hal (J. Hennessy) 2-2, Tip Abby (J. O'Brien) 3-3, Harry Direct (Burt) 4-5-3, Jolity (W.

### IN THIS CORNER

Capable and likeable Teddy Powers, who was traded to the Syracuse Warriors by the Buffalo Bisons last year, will leave this morning on the early plane for Hartford, Conn. and eventually Syracuse. The high hopes the Islanders held Thursday night for Powers remaining here, were shattered yesterday afternoon when Chamberlain received a wire from the Central Registry officials stating that Powers would have to report to Syracuse. As a result Teddy was unable to play last night's game.

Powers last year signed an "A" Form when he tried out with Buffalo Bisons of the American Hockey League. This made him the property of Buffalo who later traded him to Syracuse for another man spent last year turned professional with Vancouver Canucks. However he remained the property of Syracuse and Eddy Shore for whom he will now play for the first time.

During his short period with the Islanders the quiet-going Powers has shown himself a smart hockey player and also a popular one. He worked well on the line with Lyle Wiseman and Chuck Holdaway of the Islanders and he has shown that for that matter with any wingman who was given him. He found Carroll Bloom of the Halifax Atlantics the hardest defenseman to go around and Roy McMeekin of the Atlantics the toughest goaltender to beat.

There was more bad news for the Islanders yesterday. Defenseman Steve Brklacich had a cast put on his hand and will be sidelined for an indefinite time. Brklacich will report to his physician again in ten days to have the cast removed and the hand examined to see how the broken bone in his hand is responding. Gary Gordon, who suffered a slight concussion in the game against Halifax on Wednesday night, expects to be back in action on Monday night or possibly even tonight. Holdaway and Gray will be playing next week.

A referee to replace Hughie Gillis, who is retiring from the officiating staff of the M.M.H.L. for the fourth time this season, will arrive in Halifax over the week-end. The official, whose name is unknown here, has worked in the O.H.A. League and lives in North Bay, Ontario. He has just returned to North Bay from a vacation in Bermuda. Charlie Goode, who worked here during the first several months of the schedule is still present in Florida on a vacation. Forum manager Bill Brown had a card from Charlie yesterday.

Mrs. Bill Brown, who underwent an operation for the removal of a spinal disc in the Victoria General Hospital in Halifax several weeks ago, returned home this week and is well along the road to recovery. Mrs. Brown was also suffering from a curvature of the spine and sports fans will be glad to learn that both her disc and spinal troubles have been cured.

Charlottetown's Harry Poulton will headline another fight card in Calgary next Friday night when he steps into the ring against Indian Dick Wolfe of Portland, Oregon. Wolfe is a highly regarded fighter, having defeated Irish Jimmy Nolan twice for two of the only three defeats which Nolan suffered in three years of fighting. Reports out of Calgary claim that Poulton is doing plenty of road work and gym training for this bout and should be in top condition when fight time rolls around.

Islanders goalie Al Millar is still suffering from the effects of the cheek bone injury he received in Glace Bay a week ago. As a result of the injury he has an occasional hemorrhage and it is probable that the bone may be fractured although it is still impossible to tell. The Miners' Jimmy MacKenzie has cartilage trouble in his nose and may undergo an operation in Glace Bay. He has missed several games as the result of his nasal troubles.

## Glace Bay Miners Blank Short-Handed Islanders 2-0 Here Last Night

The Glace Bay Miners had a long wait for Kenny Watson but the little centerman proved last night that the wait was well worthwhile as he led the Miners to a 2-0 victory over the short-handed Charlottetown Islanders in a game at the Forum.

Watson fired one goal and set up the other as the Miners scored in each of the first and second periods and then hung on in the third to blank the Islanders and give goalie Don Lockhart his seventh shutout of the season.

The shutout was well deserved by the Miners goalie who came up with a spectacular show in the early minutes of the first period and played steady hockey throughout the remainder of the contest. He was aided by some erratic marksmanship on the part of the Islanders forwards.

The Islanders skated onto the ice without the services of defenseman Steve Brklacich and forwards Bob Gray, Chuck Holdaway, Gary Gordon and Ted Powers. The latter was recalled by Syracuse and will leave here this morning on the early plane.

Billy Purcell and Brian Lewis of Charlottetown helped fill the gaps left by the regulars and were used sparingly by coach Murph Chamberlain. Both boys turned in good work and were marked as being having no goals scored while they were in action.

Despite the fact they were short-handed the Islanders outplayed the fast skating Miners. They enjoyed a wide edge in the early part of the first period and through most of the second but their efforts to score were either diverted by the Glace Bay defense, goalie Lockhart or poor marksmanship.

The Islanders defense, led by Lyle Wiseman, came up with a creditable performance. Wiseman, who was moved back from his right wing post to fill in for the injured Steve Brklacich, played a terrific game as he blocked well and led rush after rush into Glace Bay territory.

Approximately 1500 fans sat in on the game and they witnessed a fast and smart first period. The second period was the best of the contest as both squads opened up but the action slowed in the last twenty minutes with the Miners playing it close to protect their lead.

The Islanders swarmed to the attack immediately after the opening face-off and only the sharp work of goalie Lockhart kept them off the score sheet. But Watson's lock did deflect one puck into the net but the stick was over his shoulder when he tipped the disc and the goal was disallowed.

The Miners began to roll around the midway mark and they hemmed the Islanders in their own end of the rink with smart passing attacks. They had several scoring chances but were denied by Al Millar.

Finally Kenny Watson connected after a sustained Glace Bay attack.

## HUNTERS' CORNER

February is generally conceded to be a grim month but so far it has been a different month from most winters. Its hard to imagine that a week after this column appears in print March is already poking its nose around the corner. Then when March wanes, April, the month that ushers in the trout fishing season, is waiting to take over with its soft winds, mud and showers and... fishing baskets alighting in the sun, wet socks and waders hanging behind the stove drying out in readiness for the next trout expedition.

Once March comes in one feels that winter is over. The days are longer and the sun has new strength. True, we often have some tough blizzards to contend with in this month but the snow doesn't last long and we have pleasant thoughts to keep our minds off present troubles. Trout take a bad going over every winter but the present one saw them take a heavy blow. One could travel most anywhere by car or truck and a lot took full advantage of excellent winter driving conditions. Many a trout pool was visited and left in a shocking state of depletion.

Why anyone wants to raid springs at the heads of mill ponds in November and December and gaff out 3 and 4 pound trout that are still sick and sluggish from the seasonal spawning I can only guess. Such fish are not fit to eat at this season of the year. In fact they are far from being at their best when the season opens on April 15th. Its not until May when the flies begin to hatch and move that they begin to firm up and take on the delicate flavour peculiar to well fed trout. Its a different story with trout taken in salt water even so early as February. They feed on capelin, silversides, etc. and are in a different category so far as respective table qualities are concerned.

Even if trout make a tempting fry in February and March that is no excuse for anyone to go after them or buy them from some poacher to save themselves the risk and trouble of an unseasonable trout expedition. Its bad enough to poach salt water trout before the season opens but to invade fresh water spawning beds in November and December is the last word in piracy. There are some people who cannot resist the sight of a big trout and make every effort to get it by fair means or foul. It makes no difference whether or not its a sea green three pounder lying under a seaward bridge or a sickly spawner half ground in an inland spring shallow. If they can't gaff it or boot it ashore with their feet, they'll try and shoot it if they have a gun.

Now I'm not talking through my hat... I've been around myself this winter and... as the late John Allen, an Englishman of the

## Sydney Millionaires Shut Out Atlantics 3-0

SYDNEY, (CP)—Sydney goalie Nick Pidsodny and Halifax Atlantics' winger Frank King received match penalties for a stick-swinging incident Friday in a thrilling Maritime Major Hockey League game which the Millionaires won 3-0.

Twenty-one penalties, totalling 94 minutes, were called as the last-place Millionaires tumbled the leading Atlantics in convincing fashion. There were three misconduct and four major sentences.
